1 Wednesday, 16 November 2005

2 [Open session]

3 [The accused Brima not present]

4 [The accused Kamara and Kanu present]

5 [Upon commencing at 9.44 a.m.]

6 PRESIDING JUDGE: Good morning. I notice Mr Brima is not  
7 in court. Ms Thompson -- sorry, Mr Graham?

8 MR GRAHAM: Your Honour, he is not feeling very well this  
9 morning so I think he is going to the infirmary this morning.

10 PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you, I will have that recorded.

11 Mr Johnson.

12 MS NGUNYA: Good morning, Your Honours.

13 PRESIDING JUDGE: Good morning, Ms Ngunya.

14 MS NGUNYA: I will address the Court this morning.

15 Your Honours, I will stand guided by the Court, because from what  
16 I heard from last week's hearing, last Monday, we were going to  
17 meet today, a mention date, to assess the way forward following  
18 the expiry of the notice and filing period for the Defence which  
19 expires today. Defence objections have been duly filed and  
20 received by the Prosecution yesterday afternoon and at this stage  
21 the [Microphone not activated]

22 PRESIDING JUDGE: Just a moment, please. I seem to have  
23 lost -- Ms Ngunya, have you got your --

24 THE INTERPRETER: Your Honours, the interpreters are asking  
25 the counsel to please lower her speed so that we can interpret  
26 for the accused persons. Please.

27 PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you, Mr Interpreter. Ms Ngunya,  
28 you heard the interpreter.

29 MS NGUNYA: Actually, I didn't. If he could please repeat



1 himself.

2 PRESIDING JUDGE: What he said was if you could please  
3 speak a little slower in order to allow them to interpret.

4 MS NGUNYA: Okay, I will repeat that.

5 PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you, Ms Ngunya.

6 MS NGUNYA: Your Honours, I was saying that yesterday  
7 afternoon we received the Defence objections to our Rule 92 bis  
8 notice filed on 1 November 2005. Your Honours, in light of the  
9 objections raised by the Defence, the Prosecution would  
10 appreciate the chance to respond to those objections in writing.  
11 Our objections will not be long and we intend to file them before  
12 close of business today.

13 PRESIDING JUDGE: Ms Ngunya, I am not aware of any  
14 provision in Rule 92 that gives a right of reply.

15 MS NGUNYA: Actually that is another reason why I was  
16 coming to the Court this morning is to find out if you would  
17 require oral submissions or whether we can go by way of what is  
18 already in writing. That is what I was coming to next. Also the  
19 direction of the Court as to how you would like us to proceed  
20 either by oral submission or by what we have already tendered  
21 before the Court.

22 Your Honours, I have also addressed this point with Defence  
23 counsel and at this stage they have no objection and I would like  
24 to let the Court know that if I am to proceed with my oral  
25 submissions, I am quite prepared to do so.

26 That is all Your Honours.

27 PRESIDING JUDGE: When you say oral submissions, Ms Ngunya,  
28 what are you talking about? Because 92 bis allows you to give  
29 notice and for the Defence to raise objection. When you are



1 saying oral submissions and written submissions, what are you  
2 referring to?

3 MS NGUNYA: I'm sorry, Your Honour. I wanted to respond to  
4 their objections raised yesterday, if that is agreeable by  
5 Your Honours. If not, so be it.

6 PRESIDING JUDGE: We will just confer, please.

7 [Trial Chamber conferred]

8 PRESIDING JUDGE: We have considered the application.  
9 There is a procedure laid down in Rule 92 bis of the Rules of  
10 Procedure and Evidence. It does not contain a right of reply.  
11 The Trial Chamber will consider admission of the documents and  
12 rule on objections when the documents are formally tendered.

13 MS NGUNYA: Thank you, Your Honour. In that case I would  
14 like to try and formally tender the documents before the Court.

15 PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you, Ms Ngunya. Please proceed.

16 MS NGUNYA: Your Honour, again I stand guided by the Court.  
17 I have an Annex A which has listed all the documents that the  
18 Prosecution wishes to tender. With your permission I would just  
19 like to call them out by their number. That way if all parties  
20 can refer to their Annex A.

21 PRESIDING JUDGE: [Indiscernible] copy of --

22 MS NGUNYA: Sorry, Annex 1. I believe Annex 1 has been  
23 served on the Court and on the Defence. Your Honours --

24 PRESIDING JUDGE: I would appreciate it if you would just  
25 pause while we get that in front of us, please. Thank you,  
26 Ms Ngunya for your patience. We have that before us now. If you  
27 would please proceed.

28 MS NGUNYA: Thank you, Your Honours.

29 PRESIDING JUDGE: Sorry, we have only one copy at the



1 moment, but we'll work on that.

2 MS NGUNYA: Thank you, Your Honours.

3 Your Honour, the first document is document number 1,

9 we will give a ruling on this on Monday 18th November 2005. If  
10 there is no other matters, we will adjourn the Court to 18th  
11 November 2005 for decision.

12           MR GRAHAM: Your Honour, I think Friday is the 18th. I  
13 thought I heard you say Monday.

14           PRESIDING JUDGE: The Monday, so if I have got my date  
15 wrong, I apologise. I will look up my diary again, Mr Graham.  
16 You are quite right, Mr Graham, it is the 21st. For purposes of  
17 record, we will reserve until Monday, 21st November 2005.

19 21st November 2005.
