I am informed that we have 09:47:18 5 to swear in an interpreter, and we will do that before we proceed 6 7 on with the evidence. 8 Mr Court attendant, please arrange for the interpreter to 9 come into the well of the Court. 09:48:34 10 [Interpreter sworn] 11 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Thank you, Mr Interpreter. Does the 12 interpreter need to get into position before we can proceed? 13 THE REGISTRAR: Yes, just a few minutes. 14 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Thank you. Whilst we're doing that, are there any preliminary issues that counsel wish to raise? Or I'll 09:48:46 15 16 have the witness called. 17 MR LANSANA: I have no preliminary issues. We left off yesterday when you were informing 16 this Court about TF1-274 visiting your house at number 5 Council 17 Road, is it? 18 Α. Yes, please. 19 0. Thank you. 5 Council Road, Kailahun, on the 3rd February, 09:51:17 20 2011; is that correct? 21 Α. Yes. 22 Q. Thank you. And you informed this Court that using 23 Eric Senessie's phone, he placed a call, came back, and handed 24 the phone over to Mr Senessie, correct? 09:51:29 25 Α. Exactly so. I did not 24 touch it. Eric Koi Senessie did not open it in my presence. 1 09:57:25 25 did not know the content. I only knew - I only know that it was 26 a brown envelope that he handed over to him. 27 MR LANSANA: 28 Q. Thank you. After he handed over the envelope to 29 Mr Senessie, did anything else happen thereafter?

1 Α. Yes. Everybody went their separate ways. Two days after 2 that --3 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Yes, please continue. THE WITNESS: Two days after that, Eric Koi Senessie came 4 09:58:11 to the house. He came a little bit earlier than the normal time 5 that he usually comes. He met me sitting down at my usual place 6 7 in my veranda with my legs outstretched, relaxing, drinking my 8 tea. 9 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Continue, please. 09:58:46 10 THE WITNESS: I said, Eric, didn't you travel? And he 11 said, In God's name, I did not have transport fare. I went to 12 one of my cousins to loan me, but I couldn't find him. 13 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Yes, please continue. 14 THE WITNESS: Then he sat down and I told my wife to serve him tea. As we sat down discussing, Witness TF1-274 arrived at 09:59:22 15 16 the same time between 8.30 and 9.00 in the evening hours. 17 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Yes, please continue. 18 THE WITNESS: When he saw Mr Eric Koi Senessie, he was 19 shocked --10:00:12 20 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Yes. 21 THE WITNESS: -- because he was not expecting him, as per 22 their discussion. 23 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Yes, continue. 24 THE WITNESS: Then he said, Where is that document that I 10:00:43 25 gave to you for you to deliver it to Prince Taylor in Bo on your way to Freetown? 26 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Yes. 27 28 THE WITNESS: He said, Mr Witness, I couldn't go because I 29 hadn't any money, but I gave one of our brothers, Jabbi Sampha -

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1 I gave the document to one of our brother's called Jabbi Sampha, 2 or Sampha Jabbi. MR LANSANA: 3 Q. 4 Thank you. 10:01:47 5 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Continue, please. Are they under escort, or are 13 they alone? 14 They are always under escort, My Lord. Α. Q. So can a witness make a phone call from Brussels Airport 14:54:11 15 16 when they are being escorted to The Hague? 17 Α. From my experience, no, My Lord. 18 Are you aware of the procedures for witnesses to make phone Q. 19 calls from The Hague? 14:54:52 20 Α. Yes, My Lord. 21 Q. Can you please explain to the Court? 22 Α. When they're in the care in The Hague, we normally allow 23 them to make phone calls to their immediate relatives, and the 24 call is normally logged in a logbook which is maintained at the 14:55:49 25 safe house in The Haque. The time of the call is recorded. And 26 the - we always ask the witness - we are always present to know 27 the conversation. That's all I know, My Lord. 28 Q. Thank you. The Court has heard evidence relating to a 29 protected witness, TFI-516. Did you escort that witness?

Your Honour, yesterday we closed on a note from the Chamber 6 7 that the defendant will stay in custody. And I may have gotten 8 you perfectly wrong, but I think I heard you say that now that 9 the Prosecution had closed, the defendant would be remanded in custody. 11 JUSTICE DOHERTY: I actually said now that the Prosecution 12 had closed and the defendant had given evidence, I was 13

remanding --

16 Your Honour, I would only want to revisit this one because, 17 Your Honour, both the Prosecution and the Defence have rested 18 their case, and in my mind I reckon that there will be no further witnesses for which there will be fear of interference from the 19 15:04:25 20 defendant. That is one. And secondly, Your Honour, I am yet to 21 be aware of any adverse report either from the police station in 22 Kailahun or from Prosecution or from the WVS of any untoward 23 conduct on the part of the defendant. And I would want to also 24 reiterate the reasons that were adduced by my predecessor when he 15:05:11 25 was making his application for bail for the defendant on the 15th 26 of July 2011.

> 27 He started off on a note of him being a family man, very 28 important member of the Kailahun community and township. The 29 fact that he was a pastor at the new apostle church with about

1 300 to 400 members of his congregation. And also the fact that to his mind, which I think has been proved, he is a respecter of 2 this Court. He has tremendous respect in regard for the Special 3 Court for Sierra Leone, and I presume that is even why he - all 4 the time he's been summoned by this Chamber, he had come 15:05:57 5 voluntarily, starting with the Independent Prosecutor summoning 6 7 him on to the time when he appeared when he was arraigned before 8 this Trial Chamber.

He definitely is not in my 18 But that notwithstanding, in the event that Your Honour mind. 19 thinks or has any misgivings about him being a flight risk, I 15:07:00 20 would want to apply that although he was granted bail on his own 21 recognisance, I would apply under Rule 65(D), which states that: 22 "A Judge or Trial Chamber may impose such conditions upon 23 the granting of bail to the accused as it may determine 24 appropriate including," and this is the rider, "including the 15:07:31 25 execution of a bail bond and the observance of such conditions 26 that are necessary to ensure the presence of the accused at trial and the protection of others." 27

If Your Honour is so minded, you could revisit the
conditions of his bail from self-recognisance, for instance, to a

1 requirement of a bail bond. But the overriding concern I have, Your Honour, is I implore this Court that given the reasons I 2 have canvassed, and given the comportment of the defendant, that 3 the defendant will be - the defendant's bail be restored. 4 Thank you very much, Your Honour. 15:08:28 5 JUSTICE DOHERTY: Your response, Mr Gardner, please. 6 7 MR GARDNER: Well, the first thing I would say, 8 Your Honour, is I differ with counsel about the defendant's 9 circumstances in two significant respects: First of all, I don't believe he has shown a lot of respect for this Court. The 15:08:52 10 11 testimony established - my interpretation of it - he kind of 12 ducked out of testifying at The Hague, where this Court was 13 sitting; and second, I could tell you that the circumstances 14 leading up to my finally interviewing him when I was doing my investigation could only be characterised as a cat-and-mouse 15:09:18 15 16 game. 17 Having said that, I misheard the Court last night and I 18 thought Your Honour was continuing him under the previous bail 19 conditions.
