1 Friday, 18 April 2008 2 [The accused present] [Open session] 3 4 [Upon commencing at 9.30 a.m.] PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you. It would appear that 09:29:46 5 appearances are as yesterday? 6 7 MS ALAGENDRA: No, your Honour. PRESIDING JUDGE: No? Well then please let me have 8 9 appearances, Ms Al agendra. MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honour, for the Prosecution is 09:29:58 10 Mr Nicholas Koumjian, myself Shyamala Alagendra, Alain Werner and 11 12 Maja Dimitrova. Thank you, your Honour. PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you. Yes, Mr Anyah? 13 MR ANYAH: Yes, good morning, your Honours. Good morning, 14 Madam President. For the Defence is myself Morris Anyah, Silas 09:30:17 15 Chekera from the Office of the Principal Defender and Lansana 16 17 Kamara. 18 PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you. If there are no other 19 matters, I will remind the witness of his declaration. 09:30:33 20 Mr Witness, you recall that you took the solemn declaration to 21 tell the truth. I again remind you that that declaration is 22 binding on you and you must answer questions truthfully. Do you 23 understand? THE WITNESS: Yes, my Lord. 24 09:30:47 25 PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you. Please proceed. 26 WITNESS: TF1-334 [On former affirmation] EXAMINATION-IN-CHIEF BY MS ALAGENDRA: [Cont.] 27 28 Q. Good morning, Mr Witness. 29 Good morning, my Lord. Α.

1 Q. Mr Witness, before we continue from where you stopped 2 yesterday, there are a few matters I want to clarify about your 3 testimony in court yesterday. First I want to take you back to 4 your testimony about a radio communication that took place in Kabala and I want to read back your answer to you. You said: 09:31:26 5 "This communication took place in my presence and in 6 7 Superman's response you will know that Mosquito was asking him where the chairman was and then he said, 'Please, sir. 8 Heisin 9 his village close to Binkolo, but SAJ Musa has now mobilised men'. Myself, together with Papa, he said we should go now to 09:31:58 10 collect the chairman from Binkolo and to head towards Kono." 11 This was your answer yesterday, witness. 12 13 Α. Yes, my Lord. 14 Q. Now, can you clarify for the Court who was it who said, 09:32:18 15 "Please, sir. He is in his village close to Binkolo"? This was the response from Denis Mingo, who is Superman, to 16 Α. 17 Mosqui to. 18 And who is the "he" you are referring to when you say, "He Q. 19 said we should go now to collect the chairman from Binkolo and to 09:32:41 20 head towards Kono"? 21 Mosquito ordered Superman to go and collect the chairman Α. 22 and he answered, "Yes, sir, we have already mobilised together 23 with SAJ Musa to move to go and meet chairman Johnny Paul Koroma at Binkolo." 24 09:33:09 25 Q. I am going to now ask you something about your answer in 26 relation to the move of the convoy from Makeni to Sewafe. In 27 your answer you told the Court: 28 "Because it was a long convoy and it included even the civilians that we captured in Makeni, they were all there. 29 The

1 vehicles were more than 200. We arrived in Sewafe and we waited there for the arrival of Johnny Paul Koroma." 2 Witness, why were the civilians that were captured in 3 4 Makeni part of this convoy? Α. My Lord, those civilians as we were capturing them from 09:33:45 5 Makeni we used them to carry loads, and some of the able ones 6 7 including women whom we captured in Makeni we were to take them as far as Kono. So, at the end of the day we would train them 8 9 and use them. Witness, when answering questions in relation to orders Q. 09:34:20 10 given by Johnny Paul Koroma in the village that you said is 11 12 between Woama and Tankoro you said this. You said: 13 "And then he said we should get some able bodied civilians 14 who will assist us and they will serve as recruits and that we could make sure that we burn down houses in Kono." 09:34:53 15 Did Johnny Paul explain what he meant when he said "able 16 17 bodied civilians who will assist us"? Did he explain what kind of assistance? 18 19 Exactly what he said was that some of these civilians would Α. 09:35:20 20 use to train some and the others would be engaged in doing some 21 other activities like working for us, like pounding rice and the 22 others would be used in case there was any battle, we would train them for reinforcement, to reinforce the troops. 23 24 Q. These civilians that he said that would be used to train, 09:35:45 25 did training eventually take place? 26 Yes, my Lord. Training was going on in the two areas, the Α. 27 RUF side and the SLA side. 28 Q. Where? Like in Masingbi Road we had individual trainings. 29 Α. The

1 civilians whom we had, we were giving them basic training. 2 And when was this training taking place? Q. Just after Johnny Paul had left Kono and had returned, he 3 Α. 4 tried to make sure that the ground was free of civilians so the training started. It was just basic training. 09:36:30 5 Q. Can you give us a time period? 6 7 It was within March - from mid-March to April, around Α. there. 8 9 0. Of which year? 1998. 09:36:50 10 Α. These civilians who were being trained, did you know their 11 Q. 12 age group? 13 Actually we had small boys among them whom we referred to Α. 14 as SBU, Small Boys Unit. Some were around the ages of eight, ten 09:37:19 15 and 12 and there were some other adults who were within the age 16 of 25 going on to 30. 17 Q. How did you know the ages of the SBUs? In the area where we were most of the children who were 18 Α. 19 there we asked them, because we had a man who was the political 09:37:52 20 advisor called Coachy Borno. He was doing most of those things 21 to get the details from the captured civilians. 22 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, Coachy Borno is C-O-A-C-H-Y, 23 Borno is B-O-R-N-O: 24 Q. Witness, do you know how Coachy Borno got the details of 09:38:23 25 these civilians that were being trained? 26 Α. When we got those civilians we kind of mustered them and 27 during the muster he would have a book and a file and he will 28 take down their names and ages of each and every one. And he said in case we would be successful in the operation he would 29

1 have something to do for those children. That was the assurance 2 he used to give to them. That was why he was asking for their ages, their names and after the completion of the mission he 3 4 would know what to do for them. What kind of training did these civilians and SBUs go 09:39:13 5 0. through? 6 7 Mostly we just gave them training in weaponry, that is Α. 8 basic weapon training, how to shoot a weapon. Like for some of 9 the children, the SBUs, most of the commanders just gave them machetes because we didn't have sufficient arms so they issued 09:39:44 10 out machetes to them. 11 12 Q. Were they told why they were being issued machetes? 13 Well, even myself together with the commander Bomb Blast, Α. 14 would move around. Like, for example, we will go as far as 09:40:15 15 Yomandu, wherever we targeted civilians we would use the SBUs to 16 amputate people, to amputate their arms. 17 Q. What do you mean by you will use SBUs to amputate people, to amputate their arms? How did you use them? 18 19 Like in some areas where we captured some civilians whom Α. 09:40:46 20 I and the others would capture we would make sure that the SBUs -21 we would command the SBUs saying, "Amputate these ones arms. Let 22 him or her go to Freetown and tell them that we are ready for 23 them." So it was a kind of giving out a message to the other 24 civilians that they should fear us and they should tell ECOMOG 09:41:07 25 about us. 26 Q. What would the SBUs do once they were commanded to 27 amputate? 28 Α. They were executing the orders. They executed the orders 29 that we gave to them.

Q.

1 Q. Who was training these civilians and SBUs? 2 Like in Kono, our area, the commanders who were there, the Α. 3 various commanders and like even Junior Sherrif, they were all 4 training in their various battalions. They were training, basic 09:41:54 5 training. Did you train any civilians or SBUs in Kono? Q. 6 7 Well, my own area, yes, we had civilians whom I gave Α. 8 training to; training in weaponry, how to cock a gun, to fire, to 9 fix a magazine and how to fix the ammunition into the magazines. 09:42:22 10 Q. Did you train SBUs in Kono? Well, I too was part of the trainers, but it was just basic 11 Α. 12 training because we were too engaged so we just gave them basic 13 weapon training. 14 Q. Witness, you also told the Court yesterday that Johnny Paul 09:42:53 15 Koroma said he was going to get arms and ammunition from President Charles Taylor in Liberia and the rest of your answer 16 17 was, "He would try and get them so that we would continue to hold 18 the ground." Is this something that Johnny Paul Koroma said? 19 He said this clearly in that meeting, in that village Α. 09:43:25 20 between Tankoro and Woama, he said it clearly. 21 Did he explain what he meant by "hold the ground"? 0. 22 He said Kono was a diamondiferous area, so by capturing Α. 23 Kono we would be able to get diamonds that we would use to go to 24 Liberia and purchase arms and ammunition which could support us 09:43:57 25 and we would defend Kono thoroughly and therefore we would be a 26 force to reckon with by the international community, that the 27 international community should reckon with and even the Sierra 28 Leone government. 29 Did anybody else who spoke in the meeting say this?

1 Α. As I said, it was only Issa who responded to what Johnny 2 Paul said in relation to the defence of Kono. 3 What did Issa say in relation to the defence of Kono? Q. 4 Α. As I said earlier, he said just as the chairman has said we would make sure that we should not encourage or allow any 09:44:44 5 civilian within that area, within Kono area, so they would not 6 7 have any way to regroup or be able to locate our position and they would bring in enemies to fight us. So we should not allow 8 9 houses even to exist, we should burn them down so that no civilian will be able to settle in Kono. 09:45:10 10 Witness, when you were telling the Court yesterday about 11 Q. 12 the killings that took place in Yardo Road you referred to 13 members of the squad together with the RUF. When you say 14 "members of the squad", what do you mean? 09:45:42 15 Α. I was referring to the SLA and the RUF because it was a combined troop that went to that area, captured Kono. It was a 16 17 joint operation. 18 In describing the command structure in Kono you spoke about Q. 19 battalions and companies. Were companies further divided into 09:46:10 20 squads? 21 No, I spoke about battalion in Kono. I did not talk about Α. 22 company. I spoke about battalion. You just asked me how a 23 battalion was organised. I said it comprised about four 24 companies, according to the American system, that is what builds 09:46:37 25 up a battalion. 26 Q. In Kono was the battalion also divided into companies? 27 Actually no, that did not obtain. The only thing was that Α. 28 the various battalions where they were based like Yengema, 29 Yengema is so big that we organised guard posts. It was at those

1 guard posts that we had manpower that was sent to those guard 2 We would send - for example, if these set of people go posts. and two hours the others will do four hours, something like that. 3 4 So they will change shifts. That was what was going on. And in the town we will organise patrols, like food finding patrols, 09:47:19 5 they will take some section from the battalion to go and find 6 7 food for the entire battalion.

8 Q. Who would organise patrols to find food?

9 A. Like me at the headquarters, whenever there was any food
09:47:43 10 finding patrol Bazzy, Hassan Papa Bangura would call and take
11 from various brigades - take people from the brigade and organise
12 a patrol. It was the same with the battalion.

13 Q. What would happen once the men were organised to go on food14 finding patrols?

09:48:21 15 Α. Well, the most interesting thing about food finding patrol that I have participated in, you go and wherever you locate 16 17 civilians - because at that time when I and the others captured Kono the civilians ran into the forest, so we will go as far into 18 19 the jungle and we will attack them and take away the food that 09:48:52 20 they had from them and most times we will be lucky to capture even the civilians and we used them to carry the food for us. At 21 22 times we will take along with us unarmed civilians to help us to 23 carry the food if we get some food from the other civilians. 24 Q. And these unarmed civilians that you would take with you, 09:49:17 25 where would you take them from? 26 Α. The time we entered Kono, the able ones that we captured,

28 Q. Witness, you were telling us yesterday about the command

whom the RUF and SL captured, we used them during those patrols.

29 structure that was put in place in Kono with Superman as overall

- 1 commander. Do you recall that?
- 2 A. Yes, my Lord.
- 3 Q. When was this command structure put in place?
- A. It was just after Johnny Paul had gone and I told you after
  that operation in Gandorhun when we failed to capture Koidu Geiya
  we returned. That was when the command structure was put in
  - 7 place.
  - 8 Q. Can you give us a time period?
  - 9 A. As I said earlier, it was within March '98.

09:50:3310Q.You told the Court that one of the names that you went by11was Ice T.Do you remember that?

- 12 A. Yes, my Lord.
- 13 Q. How did you get that name Ice T?
- A. Actually I got the name through honourable Papa because of
  my bravery and I was mostly engaged in the battlefront. I never
  was afraid. Whenever I was called I was always ready to go and
  attack. So they compared me to one actor in America called Ice
  T. They said the guy is always ready, so that's why they gave me
  the name Ice T.
- 09:51:28 20 Q. Witness, what, if anything, happened after the command 21 structure was put in place in Kono?
- A. Well, actually after the command structure had been put in
  place we used to go to various strategy areas, as I said, where
  the battalions were. Apart from food finding we will go and
  observe how the battalions were going on. We will go and attack.
  We will go as far as Yomandu to make sure the civilians actually
  leave the whole area.
  - 28 Q. When you say, "We will go and attack", who is we?
  - 29 A. Like me, Hassan Papa Bangura and the others from the

1 headquarters, we moved to go to Mohamed Savage in Tombodu, we 2 moved as far as Kayima to Komba Gbundema's place. Wherever 3 civilians were we attacked the place. That was what we did and 4 we burnt most of the areas in Tombodu, Yomandu. Burnt houses, attacked civilians after the command structure was now in place. 09:52:50 5 Witness, which towns in Kono were attacked? Can you just 0. 6 7 name the towns? Tombodu was one of the towns that I too participated in its 8 Α. 9 attack. Went as far as Yomandu and Kayima. JUDGE SEBUTINDE: Ms Alagendra, what was that word on line 09:53:18 10 10? There is an indiscernible word that actually even I didn't 11 12 get. As far as? 13 MS ALAGENDRA: The first one, your Honour, "We moved to go to Mohamed Savage is the first one." 14 09:53:36 15 JUDGE SEBUTINDE: The one after that. MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, if I can just clarify that 16 17 with the witness: 18 Witness when you were explaining the meaning of "we will go Q. 19 and attack" the answer we have is: "Like me, Hassan Papa Bangura 09:54:06 20 and the others from the headquarters, we moved to go to Mohamed 21 Savage in Tombodu. We moved as far as" - I think maybe you named 22 a place - "to come back to Komba Gbundema"? 23 I said as far as --Α. Please proceed witness, as far as? 24 Q. 09:54:26 25 Α. Yomandu and Kayima. Those villages. 26 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, Kayima is K-A-Y-I-M-A: 27 Q. Apart from Tombodu, Yomandu and Kayima do you recall the 28 names of any other villages or towns that were attacked? 29 Well, we would return, the operation commander Hassan Papa Α.

1 Bangura would take me and some other men to go to as far as 2 We would go there and meet the battalion commander and Yengema. 3 we would go and attack - because as soon as they saw us they knew 4 we had gone there for attacks, so they will join us and we would go and attack. And Bumpe too. Those were the areas that we 09:55:28 5 attacked to move civilians away from the entire area. 6 7 Who would join you to go on attack? 0. Α. This was a combined attack. There was the RUF and the SLA 8 9 too. These attacks you are talking about, can you recall over Q. 09:55:49 10 what period of time they took place? 11 12 Α. That was within March/April as I am saying. At that time 13 we had a continuous attack and burning of houses. That was our 14 operation in Kono. Because at that time we hadn't any enemy 09:56:15 15 threat. We were just burning and attacking civilians. That was 16 all we were doing. 17 Q. When you say within March or April, did it all happen 18 within that month? 19 Well, it continued to happen until I and Commander Bomb Α. 09:56:44 20 Blast withdrew from Kono. Until the time of the withdrawal 21 burning used to take place. May/June, around there, 1998. 22 In March or April which year are you talking about? 0. 23 1998. Α. 24 Q. Witness, do you know what happened in Bumpe during these 09:57:13 25 attacks? 26 Well, during the attack at Bumpe the only thing was Amara Α. 27 Kallay got some civilians whose heads were decapitated and put on 28 the guard posts. There was a stick put on the guard post and 29 they attached their heads on the sticks. The same thing happened

	2	Q. What do you mean by - your Honours, I think the name was
	3	Amara Kallay. Is that the name you said, witness?
	4	A. Yes, he was the battalion commander at Bumpe.
09:57:59	5	Q. And when you say Amara Kallay got civilians whose heads
	6	were decapitated and fixed on the guard post, who decapitated
	7	these civilians' heads?
	8	A. He, the Amara Kallay himself participated and the troops
	9	that were there. Most of the civilians who were captured, their
09:58:21	10	heads were cut off and put on the sticks just to create fear for
	11	ECOMOG or even the civilians.
	12	Q. How do you know this?
	13	A. I witnessed it. It happened in my presence.
	14	Q. Apart from this did anything else happen in Bumpe during
09:58:44	15	this time period?
	16	A. Well, the Bumpe Town was almost completely burnt down
	17	except the area where the battalion occupied, but it was
	18	completely burnt down.
	19	Q. And who was responsible for burning Bumpe?
09:59:06	20	A. Well, as I said, it was a joint patrol, joint operation.
	21	We would move from the brigade, the RUF too would come, we would
	22	go there and burn. It was just burning that we were engaged in.
	23	Koidu Town was so big and even Bumpe was so big so we didn't want
	24	ECOMOG or any other group to settle there. That's why we were
09:59:34	25	burning the places.
	26	Q. What was being burnt in Bumpe Town?
	27	A. The houses which were in Bumpe Town, all. Just few were
	28	left unburnt. That was where the troops, or the battalion which
	29	was there, that was where they occupied. Those were the only

1 houses that were spared.

2 Q. Who did those houses belong to?

3 A. It was the civilians who were residing in Bumpe.

4 Q. And where were those civilians when the houses were being 10:00:09 5 burnt?

As I said, before ever we would bring a battalion there we Α. 6 7 would attack some would be lucky, we will capture them, some 8 others will escape. Those that we were able to capture, if any 9 one of them will be fit we will locate the person and train the person and the others who were not fit, we will execute them. 10:00:35 10 The houses that were being burnt, were they empty? 11 Q. 12 Α. Some houses were empty, yes, because when we would attack 13 civilians would escape. Some of them, we would run after them, 14 we would chase them. Like for Bumpe some houses were empty. 10:00:59 15 0. You say some houses were empty, what about other houses? Because there were times, some houses, we will lock them. 16 Α. 17 When we set the houses ablaze you will hear people screaming from within the houses whilst the house would be on fire. 18 19 Who were those people who were screaming? 0. 10:01:19 20 Α. All I knew was those people were the civilians who were in 21 They were the ones screaming in the houses on fire. the village. 22 Do you know what, if anything, happened to those civilians? 0. The houses would be completely burnt down. We would not 23 Α. 24 bother ourselves to go and watch whether anything was in there 10:01:47 25 because we knew the houses were completely burnt down. 26 Q. But do you know what happened to those civilians who you 27 say were inside the houses when the houses were being set on 28 fi re? As I said, I was not going there to watch, you would hear 29 Α.

1 the screaming and I believe most of them died in there. You 2 would hear the screaming and mostly when we put the houses on 3 fire we will surround the houses. There will be soldiers and RUF 4 outside the houses so if anybody attempts to go out we just shoot So that is it. 10:02:20 5 the person. Witness, did anything happen in Sewafe? Q. 6 7 Sewafe where Lieutenant Mosquito was, when we went there we Α. display - he displayed corpses in the streets and he too 8 9 displayed human heads at the guard post and corpses on the 10:02:49 10 streets. That's what he did. How do you know this? 11 Q. 12 Α. When we went on patrol in that area that was what we saw. 13 We met, Mosquito had displayed corpses in the street and 14 displayed human heads on sticks at the guard post, just to make 10:03:11 15 the area fearful. Do you know who was responsible for the killing of those 16 Q. 17 ci vi l i ans? 18 Well, he himself said that he and his men had done that. Α. 19 Do you know who were his men? 0. Yes, as I said, Mosquito was an SLA and he had RUF with 10:03:31 20 Α. 21 There were two forces, RUF and SLA. him. 22 Are you able to say how many corpses you saw in Sewafe? 0. 23 No, I cannot tell you that now because they were just Α. 24 displayed there. I cannot say I counted. No, I did not count, 10:04:01 25 but I saw the corpses displayed. 26 Q. Did anything else happen in Sewafe that you know about 27 during this time? 28 Α. The only thing, they were on stand by and we came back to 29 the headquarters.

1 Q. Were there houses in Sewafe? 2 Α. That area where they were, as I said we had burnt some 3 The unburnt places were where they occupied. areas. 4 Q. Witness, do you know if Sewafe is known by any other name? People used to call the place Njaiama Sewafe. 10:04:43 5 Α. MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, Njaiama is spelt N-J-A-I-M-A: 6 7 Witness, do you know what if anything happened in Yengema 0. during this time? 8 9 Α. Well, Yengema, as I said, where Tito was, the same thing 10:05:22 10 continued and happened there. They displayed bodies and human heads were displayed on sticks at the checkpoints. Wherever you 11 12 go you see heads on sticks. Yengema was completely burnt down. 13 Q. By who? 14 Α. Tito was the commander there, because when we go and we 10:05:47 15 meet them on the operation Tito and the SLA and the RUF they were there. The operation was continuous, just as I said. 16 17 Q. How do you know what happened in Yengema? 18 When I go on patrol with Commander Bomb Blast, because we Α. 19 go there to see we will meet them on the operation and they will 10:06:10 20 tell us that they have to continue even after that time. ALL 21 these towns that I am naming these are big towns, so it was a 22 daily affair. They used to burn the towns on a daily basis and whosoever they saw, civilians, they would kill that person. 23 24 Q. When you say Yengema was completely burnt down, what was 10:06:35 25 burnt in Yengema? 26 Α. The houses. The houses in Yengema were burnt down 27 completely. 28 Q. And who did those houses belong to? 29 Well, it was the civilians who were resident in Yengema. Α.

1 Q. Did anything happen to the civilians who owned those 2 houses? As I said, when I and Commander Bomb Blast would go on 3 Α. 4 patrols we would meet them on the action. We will go to their battalion headquarters, where they were, and Tito would explain 10:07:11 5 and we will see ourselves burning going on. That was what was 6 going on in the villages. It was an organised command. 7 Where were the civilians when the houses were being burnt 8 0. 9 in Yengema? Since we went there on a visit, Tito just said some 10:07:30 10 Α. civilians had been captured and some others had escaped. That 11 12 was what he told us. 13 JUDGE SEBUTINDE: Ms Alagendra, when the witness said - you 14 asked him who burnt the houses in Yengema and he said, "It was an 10:07:56 15 organised command. We would meet them on the action. We would go on patrols and we would meet them on action", who is "them"? 16 17 This is line 12, I think, of page 18. MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, I will clarify that with the 18 19 witness: 10:08:33 20 0. Witness, when you said in relation to the burnings in 21 Yengema you said, "When I and Commander Bomb Blast would go on 22 patrols we would meet them on the action", who is the "them" that 23 you are referring to? 24 Like I have said, like Yengema when we went with Tito, Α. 10:08:59 25 Tito, the SLA and the RUF who were there those were the people 26 I was referring to who were doing the burning - the burning in 27 Yengema. The burning of the houses. 28 Q. Now, you have said that you participated in the attack in 29 Tombodu.

	12	in Yengema, I was asking you where were those civilians whose
	13	houses were being burnt?
	14	A. As I said earlier Tito only informed us that whilst they
10:10:20	15	were there they would capture some of the civilians and some
	16	others escaped, so when they escaped they would burn their
	17	houses.
	18	Q. Did you tell you if anything happened to civilians during
	19	the burning of the houses?
10:10:35	20	A. Well he said the civilians whom they captured, those who
	21	were not strong enough they will kill them.
	22	Q. Witness, my question to you is in relation to whether
	23	anything happened to civilians while houses were being burnt.
	24	PRESIDING JUDGE: Pause, Ms Alagendra. Mr Anyah, you are
10:11:09	25	on your feet.
	26	MR ANYAH: Yes, I make an objection because at this point
	27	the question is inviting speculation. The witness has drawn a
	28	line, if you consider his responses, in maintaining that he was
	29	not present when some of these events took place. He heard all

1 of this from the commander, Tito, and he keeps drawing the line 2 saying on the basis of what Tito has told him and Papa Bangura 3 this is what he knows about what happens to civilians. They are 4 now pressuring him to the point where I suspect they want him to say in more detail whether people were in houses when they were 10:11:40 5 burnt and the like and he does not appear that he is comfortable 6 7 getting to that degree of specificity.

8 PRESI DI NG JUDGE: Ms Al agendra, your reply?

9 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honour, all along the witness has been 10:11:58 10 testifying about what he was told by Tito, my line of questioning 11 is about what he was told and as pointed out by Judge Lussick and 12 I myself don't think the witness understands the question. So, 13 if I may attempt for the last time to see if I can rephrase the 14 question in a way that the witness can understand.

10:12:22 15 PRESIDING JUDGE: He has not specifically answered the 16 question --

17 MS ALAGENDRA: Yes.

18 PRESIDING JUDGE: -- and I will allow it to be rephrased.
19 However, he answered - he gave an answer to - he answered, but
10:12:33 20 not to the point raised in the question. I will therefore allow
21 the question.

22 MS ALAGENDRA:

Q. Witness, when Tito was telling you about what happened in
Yengema, did he say anything about what happened to civilians
10:12:56 25 when houses were being burnt?

A. As I said, he only told us that some of them he was able to
capture and some others escaped. Those who were not strong
enough he said he executed them. That is why I told you when
I got to Yengema, together with Bomb Blast, the men displayed

1 corpses at Yengema. That was what I saw, corpses displayed and 2 human heads displayed as well. 3 PRESIDING JUDGE: That answers the question, Ms Alagendra. 4 MS ALAGENDRA: Witness, you told the Court that you participated in 10:13:42 5 0. attacks in Tombodu. Can you tell us what happened during the 6 7 attacks in Tombodu that you participated in? Well in Tombodu, when I, Bomb Blast, Mohamed Savage, moved 8 Α. 9 to go to Tombodu, the civilians saw us and we just gestured to them and we pretended to be a government force and they waited. 10:14:20 10 We came closer to them and we opened fire at them - we started 11 12 shooting at them - and the attacks started right there. We 13 killed a lot of them, but some others escaped. Those who were 14 unlucky died. JUDGE SEBUTINDE: Mr Interpreter, you said certain words we 10:14:49 15 just didn't get. You said, "The civilians saw us and we just" -16 17 what did you say there? THE INTERPRETER: Your Honours, the sentence was disjointed 18 19 by the witness himself. Ms Alagendra, you see the word 10:15:08 20 JUDGE SEBUTINDE: 21 "indiscernible". Actually, I didn't get the word from the 22 interpreter either. He said something that was too fast. 23 PRESIDING JUDGE: I heard the word gestured. 24 THE INTERPRETER: The word is gestured. It is gestured, 10:15:22 25 yes, your Honour. One sentence was disjointed, but he said 26 gestured. G-E-S-T-U-R-E-D, your Honour. 27 MS ALAGENDRA: 28 Q. Witness, when you say, "We just gestured to them and we 29 pretended to be a government force", what do you mean?

1 At that time the civilians were watching us. Whilst we Α. 2 were coming with vehicles we were waving to them, pretending to 3 be government forces. That was why the civilians waited, but 4 immediately we got very close to them and jumped out of the vehicles we opened fire on them in Tombodu. 10:16:08 5 Did the civilians believe that you were the government Q. 6 7 force? At that time we had on uniforms, so they just misunderstood 8 Α. 9 us to be government forces who had come to rescue them. 10:16:25 10 Q. How do you know that? I too was there. We went very close. We were waving to 11 Α. 12 them, telling them not to run away. We were shouting, "You 13 should not escape. We are reinforcements", so most of them stood 14 there in waiting. While they were there we jumped out of the 10:16:52 15 vehicles and we started firing at them. How do you know that the civilians thought you were the 16 Q. 17 government forces who came to rescue them? 18 It was the way we were shouting out to them that, "We are Α. 19 government troops. We have come to reinforce and protect you." 10:17:16 20 0. How did the civilians react to that when you said that? 21 Well they were standing there observing until we got very Α. 22 close and they were watching until we got very close to them, and 23 we - as we got very close we jumped out of the vehicles and we 24 opened heavy firing on them. 10:17:39 25 Q. Apart from yourself, Hassan Papa Bangura and Mohamed 26 Savage, were there any others in the group? 27 Α. Yes, there were RUF men. It was a combined operation. 28 Q. Are you able to say how many civilians were killed during 29 this attack?

1 Well the civilian population was so much that a lot of them Α. 2 died, more than 20, at the time we captured Tombodu. 3 Witness, apart from this attack in Tombodu that you have Q. 4 told us about, were there any other attacks in Tombodu? Well the only attack was later when Savage was there, when 10:18:28 5 Α. he had based there in Tombodu as battalion commander. At one 6 7 time we were at the headquarters and Savage sent a message that he had captured some civilians, about 77 or 78 of them, whom he 8 9 had captured, and he said they thought he was an ECOMOG officer and they were happy, saying that, "Oh, the ECOMOG guys have 10:19:01 10 come", and he asked Commander Bomb Blast Bazzy to come and see 11 these civilians and so I, Commander Bomb Blast and some other 12 guys moved to Tombodu. We got there and we saw the civilians. 13 Savage took some of them, about 15, put them into a house and 14 10:19:31 15 burnt them in the house. He amputated some of them, about 15. The rest he decapitated them and dumped them into a pit. 16 17 MR ANYAH: Could we get some foundation for the second event, the capture of the 70 civilians, as opposed to the first 18 19 event were 20 civilians were killed? 10:19:59 20 PRESIDING JUDGE: Yes, Ms Al agendra? You have heard 21 Mr Anyah's objection. 22 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, my question to this witness 23 was about another attack in Tombodu and I asked him, "Do you know 24 if there was any other attack in Tombodu apart from what you have 10:20:16 25 told us about?" 26 MR ANYAH: And his response was at page 21, starting at 27 line 8, "Well, the only attack was later when Savage" and 28 I understood that to mean a different time frame. PRESIDING JUDGE: Clarify the time, Ms Alagendra, because 29

1 he has described two different attacks - two different incidents 2 I should say. MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, my question did relate to a 3 4 separate incident, but I will clarify it with the witness: Witness, this attack you are talking about referring to the 10:20:49 5 0. 77 or 78 civilians, when did that take place? 6 7 This was after - just as I have said, it was after Savage Α. had gone and based as a battalion commander in Tombodu, while we 8 9 were at the headquarters at Masingbi Road. When did the attack that you participated in take place? Q. 10:21:15 10 That was to go - that was the capture of Tombodu. That was 11 Α. 12 what I explained about, before Savage was sent there as battalion 13 commander. 14 Q. How long after the first attack on Tombodu did the second 10:21:40 15 attack take place? It took some time actually. It took some time because 16 Α. 17 Mohamed Savage had been there now based as battalion commander 18 before he invited us. 19 Are you able to give us an estimate in terms of time? 0. 10:22:03 20 Α. It was within a month when he had been there now as 21 battalion commander, because after we had ensured that all 22 battalions were based in the areas and pushed the civilians from 23 the entire area the place was then quiet, we had no threats and 24 when Savage invited to us the headquarters, that he had some 10:22:40 25 visitors who were civilians, so we went to Tombodu to see. 26 Witness, you have said that you received a call from Q. 27 Savage, or received a message that he had captured about 77 to 78 28 civilians and you subsequently went there with Bomb Blast and 29 Bazzy to go and see these civilians. Did you see the 77 or 78

1 ci vi l i ans? Well, when we arrived we saw them. Well, as soon as we got 2 Α. 3 there Savage started displaying. He took some, put them into a 4 house and set them on fire, and some others he amputated them, and the others he cut off their heads. Like --10:23:36 5 THE INTERPRETER: Your Honours, the witness has called 6 7 names that I would like him to repeat. PRESIDING JUDGE: Pause Mr Witness. Please repeat that, 8 9 Mr Interpreter. THE INTERPRETER: He called out some names of fighters that 10:23:49 10 I didn't get clearly. 11 12 PRESIDING JUDGE: Mr Witness, the interpreter did not hear 13 the names of the fighters. Could you repeat those names, please? 14 THE WITNESS: I spoke about Staff Alhaji, Guitar Boy. 10:24:13 15 MS ALAGENDRA: Staff Alhaji is A-L-H-A-J-I. Guitar Boy is 16 Guitar spelt like the instrument, Boy. 17 JUDGE SEBUTINDE: Ms Alagendra, if you look at the answer the witness actually didn't get an opportunity I think to finish 18 19 his answer and these names he is giving are not put in context in 10:24:39 20 the answer. If you could revisit that area, please. MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, I will do. With the 21 22 permission of the Court if I can just re-put the question to get 23 a complete answer: 24 Q. Witness, can you tell us again what happened to the 77 or 10:24:55 25 78 civilians that you saw when you arrived in Tombodu? 26 Α. Well, I and Commander Bomb Blast arrived in Tombodu, Savage showed us the civilians. He said these were the people who were 27 28 rejoicing that ECOMOG had captured Tombodu because they thought 29 we were ECOMOG people because of the uniforms we had and he said

1 he was coming to display. He took some and locked them up in a 2 building and set the building ablaze. We heard them screaming. 3 And the others, he, Guitar Boy and others started amputating 4 them. The rest of the others were beheaded and he put them into a pit in Tombodu. 10:25:46 5 How many civilians were locked up in a building and the Q. 6 7 building set on fire? PRESIDING JUDGE: I think he has given us that number, 8 9 Ms Alagendra. He said about 15, didn't he? THE WITNESS: 15, yes. 10:26:04 10 MS ALAGENDRA: 11 12 Q. Did anything happen to those civilians who were inside the 13 burning building? 14 Α. Yes, they were completely burnt down. Nobody escaped 10:26:22 15 because there were soldiers surrounding the building. Nobody All of them were burnt down. 16 escaped. 17 Q. Did any of them survive? None of them survived. You will see the skeletons. 18 Α. 19 Do you know how many civilians were amputated? 0. 10:26:49 20 Α. Yes, about 15 civilians were amputated and he told them to 21 go and tell ECOMOG that he was in Tombodu as battalion commander. 22 Do you know who was doing the amputating? 0. 23 Savage, Guitar Boy, Staff Alhaji and there were some SBUs, Α. 24 they were doing the amputation. 10:27:18 25 Q. Were you present when the amputation was going on? 26 Α. It was right in my presence. Bomb Blast was there and 27 I was there. 28 Q. Are you able to tell us the age group of the civilians who 29 were being amputated?

	1	A. These were young people. You will see that they were
	2	within the ages of 20, 25. They were young men.
	3	Q. Can you describe how the amputation was taking place?
	4	A. They were amputating them from the wrist area and telling
10:28:03	5	them to go and tell ECOMOG.
	6	Q. Do you know how many civilians were decapitated and put
	7	into the pit?
	8	A. Well, there were about 78, the rest of the others whose
	9	heads were beheaded were dumped into the pit.
10:28:32	10	Q. This pit that you are referring to, witness, did it have a
	11	name?
	12	A. Pits where they had dug - where they had dug for diamonds.
	13	That was the pit.
	14	Q. Did it become known by any name?
10:28:55	15	A. Yes, later it had a name. I think it was something like
	16	Savage Pit in Kono.
	17	Q. Do you know why it was called Savage Pit?
	18	A. Well, it was the number of - it was because of the number
	19	of corpses and heads that were in there. That was why the place
10:29:24	20	was called Savage Pit.
	21	Q. Witness, you said yesterday that Mohamed Savage also went
	22	by the name Changa Bulanga, is that correct?
	23	A. Yes, sir, my Lord we had Changa Bulanga and later he was
	24	called Mr Die.
10:29:47	25	Q. You may have told us yesterday at which point in time he
	26	got that name, but can you remind us, please?
	27	A. Yes, my Lord.
	28	Q. When was that?
	29	A. As I said, when we captured Kono and when we based in

	1	Tombodu. That was when the name was given to him, Changa
	2	Bul anga.
	3	Q. Was it after or before this incident?
	4	A. He had had the name and when he went to - it was before
10:30:24	5	that incident. It was from that incident that we gave him the
	6	name Changa Bulanga.
	7	Q. Witness, now you have said it was before that incident and
	8	then you say it was from that incident, which is it? Is it
	9	before that incident or is it because of that incident he got the
10:30:44	10	name?
	11	A. It was after the incident that he got the name Changa
	12	Bul anga.
	13	Q. While you and Bomb Blast were in Tombodu at this time do
	14	you recall if any of the commanders came there during this
10:31:09	15	particular incident I am talking about?
	16	A. Yes, my Lord.
	17	Q. Who?
	18	A. Well, Superman himself came to Tombodu.
	19	Q. What did he do when he came?
10:31:27	20	A. Savage showed him the pit and he told him where he cremated
	21	the people and Superman was shocked and said, "Savage, these are
	22	the things that people will be charged to court for. This is
	23	crime against humanity. These things that you are doing, this is
	24	crime against humanity." After which Superman came back and he
10:31:54	25	was drinking palm wine. All of us were drinking palm wine.
	26	Q. When you say all of us were drinking palm wine, who?
	27	A. Superman, Savage, Bomb Blast, everybody, because there was
	28	palm wine which Savage had. It was brought for him so we were
	29	drinking the palm wine.

1 PRESIDING JUDGE: Ms Alagendra, I really don't want to be 2 pedantic but the witness used the word "cremated the people" and 3 I haven't got evidence that they were cremated. 4 JUDGE SEBUTINDE: Also I think the evidence was they drank 10:32:33 5 palm wine. PRESI DI NG JUDGE: Not palm oil, they would be in serious 6 7 trouble. Palm wine, your Honours. 8 THE WITNESS: Palm wine. 9 PRESIDING JUDGE: I wouldn't like to think of the effects of drinking palm oil. 10:32:46 10 MS ALAGENDRA: 11 12 Q. Witness, you said when Superman came Savage showed him the 13 pit and he told him where he cremated the people. Now when 14 describing what happened in Tombodu you spoke about civilians 10:33:11 15 whose heads were decapitated and put into a pit, but you did not talk about any cremation taking place? 16 17 Α. I did not get that clearly. The answer that you have given us, witness, "Savage showed 18 Q. 19 him", meaning Superman, "the pit and he told him where he 10:33:42 20 cremated the people." 21 Α. Yes, my Lord. 22 What did you mean by "cremated"? 0. 23 The house where you will see the ashes and the bones where Α. 24 the burning had taken place, where these 15 civilians were burnt 10:34:05 25 in the house you will see, where he went and showed Superman you 26 see the ashes. 27 PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you, I understand the situation 28 now. MS ALAGENDRA: 29

	1	Q. Witness, you have said that Superman came and when he saw
	2	all this he said this is something one could be charged for a
	3	crime against humanity for. Do you know if Superman took any
	4	action against Savage for this?
10:34:42	5	A. My Lord, as I have told you Superman, Hassan Papa Bangura,
	6	myself and Savage were just drinking palm wine. No action was
	7	taken against him, nor was he being threatened that he would be
	8	changed from the battalion, no. We were just drinking palm wine.
	9	Q. Did Savage continue to be the commander in Tombodu after
10:35:08	10	this incident?
	11	A. Yes, my Lord, Savage continued to be a commander there.
	12	Q. Witness, during this time did you go to Jagbwema Fiama?
	13	A. The only time I went there was with Hassan Papa Bangura.
	14	I went there on a patrol to see how the ground was doing.
10:35:39	15	Q. Do you know if anything happened there?
	16	A. The only thing I saw at Jagbwema Fiama, we met houses which
	17	had been burnt down and the commander was there. I said before
	18	human heads were displayed on sticks. That is what I saw at
	19	Jagbwema Fiama.
10:36:06	20	Q. These human heads that were being displayed on sticks, who
	21	were they? Whose heads were they?
	22	A. According to the commander who was there, Junior, he said
	23	some civilians were attempting to come to the village and settle.
	24	Those were the civilians who were captured and killed and their
10:36:29	25	heads were displayed just so that it would be a warning to
	26	others.
	27	Q. Do you know who killed these civilians?
	28	PRESIDING JUDGE: Yes, Mr Anyah?
	29	MR ANYAH: Yes, I am merely seeking some foundation.

1 I recall when we started the line of questioning there were four towns in question, Tombodu, Yomandu, Kayima and Bumpe, in 2 3 relation to attacks on Kono. Counsel has covered them and now we 4 are in Jagbwema Fiama and I don't know if this is the same time period that we are talking about. 10:37:08 5 PRESIDING JUDGE: Ms Al agendra? 6 7 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honour, I can clarify that with the witness. 8 9 PRESIDING JUDGE: Very well, thank you. MS ALAGENDRA: 10:37:14 10 Witness, in relation to this incident in Jagbwema Fiama, do 11 Q. 12 you recall when it took place? 13 Α. Well, just as I had earlier said, in Jagbwema Fiama we had 14 a battalion which was headed by Captain Junior, so I and Operation Commander Bomb Blast went on a patrol in that area. 10:37:36 15 We went on a patrol and saw this incident. 16 17 Q. Witness, I am seeking a time period. When is it that you 18 went there and saw this incident? 19 That was in 1998, just as the battalions had been formed in Α. 10:38:02 20 those areas. 1998, I think March, July, April. March/April 1998. 21 22 0. Do you know who killed the civilians in Jagbwema Fiama? 23 The only thing Captain Junior told me was that they were Α. 24 the ones who killed the civilians. The civilians had attempted 10:38:32 25 to come to the village and - to the town and stay and live there, 26 so that was why they killed them so others will fear not to come 27 there again. 28 Q. When you say "they", "they are the ones who killed the 29 civilians", who is "they"?

1 Α. I said he, himself, and his men. I mean the RUF and the 2 SLA who were on the ground. They did that. 3 Do you know who burnt the houses? Q. 4 Α. Even that one he told me that they did burning so civilians would not come there to live. 10:39:15 5 Do you know if at the time they were burning the houses the 0. 6 7 houses were empty? Well, I did not go into details to ask about those 8 Α. No. 9 areas. He only told us that the civilians who attempted to come they captured them and then they killed them and then they burnt 10:39:42 10 down houses so that civilians will not be able to come and settle 11 12 in those areas. Now, how long were you in Jagbwema Fiama at this time when 13 0. 14 you went and witnessed this? 10:39:58 15 Α. Well, we did not stay there. We returned to Jagbwema Fiama and then later went back to the headquarters at Masingbi Road. 16 17 Q. Now when you left Jagbwema Fiama and you were heading towards Masingbi Road, did you meet anybody on the way? 18 19 Well, yes, we met with Colonel Isaac Mongor. He also told Α. 10:40:27 20 us that he was going on patrol. He had a twin barrel and then he 21 stopped us. 22 0. And what happened? Well, we had a young civilian in the vehicle who was 23 Α. 24 actually gallant in structure. He was a young man. Isaac saw 10:40:52 25 him and then he asked me why - the reason why we were going with 26 that man to Koidu Town. Then he said that we had all said that 27 Koidu should be a non-civilian zone, but I told him that this man 28 is fit enough and he will be able to do this thing. But then he 29 said, no, the man should come down. Then when the man came down

1 he ordered one amongst the RUF to - they shot the guy in his head and the twin barrel rolled on top of him. So, I returned 2 together with my commander to Koidu Town. 3 4 Q. When you say, "I told him this man is fit enough and he will be able to do this thing", what do you mean? 10:41:33 5 Well, I told him that this man is fit for training and this Α. 6 7 man will be able to carry arms and he will serve as manpower for But then he said, no. He said, "We had all agreed that we 8 us. 9 shouldn't allow any civilian any longer", so he said I should put him down and then when I put him down they shot him in his head 10:42:04 10 and the twin barrel rolled on top of him. 11 Now, who is saying this to you? 12 Q. 13 Α. It was Colonel Isaac Mongor who said this to me. When you say, "They shot him in his head", who is "they"? 14 Q. I said he ordered one amongst his RUF junior soldiers. He 10:42:25 15 Α. gave him the order to shoot him and then he shot him in his head. 16 17 The guy dropped, he died and then the twin barrel rolled on top 18 of him. 19 What is a twin barrel? 0. Well, it is an anti-aircraft weapon which was planted -10:42:49 20 Α. 21 mounted on top of a vehicle; one of the vehicles we had in Kono. 22 It was mounted in a Bedford truck. It was an anti-aircraft 23 weapon, but there were two - two anti-aircrafts mounted on top of that vehicle. 24 10:43:13 25 Q. And how did that vehicle roll over the civilian? 26 Α. After the civilian boy was shot, the driver reversed and 27 later rolled over him. The front tyres - the front wheels - and 28 the back wheels all rolled over him. 29 Did you know who the driver was? Q.

1 Α. Well he had an SLA fellow who was driving the twin barrel 2 vehicle in Kono, but I can't recall his name. 3 He had an SLA driving the vehicle, who is "he"? Q. 4 Α. It was Isaac who had an SLA who was driving the twin barrel vehi cl e. 10:44:09 5 Is it the same Isaac Mongor you are referring to? Q. 6 7 Α. Yes. Witness, you have been testifying about - before I move on 8 0. 9 to that, after this incident and you got back to Masingbi Road, did you do anything? 10:44:31 10 Well, we got back to Masingbi Road and Bazzy said that the 11 Α. 12 houses that were in front of us we should burn them down because 13 it is possible enemies will occupy there to attack us, so when we 14 got there that was the burning we started. Myself, Bazzy, the 10:44:57 15 RUF and the SLAs who were around, we all started burning the houses around the Masingbi Road. 16 17 Q. Did any of the senior commanders know about this incident 18 involving Isaac Mongor? 19 Bomb Blast knew about it and Superman knew about the Α. 10:45:21 20 incident, because they brought up the question to me. Ibrahim 21 Bazzy too knew about the incident. 22 0. How do you know that they knew? 23 Well, when we got there Isaac later called and they asked Α. 24 why did we want to break the law because we had all said that we 10:45:49 25 shouldn't bring civilians again. Then I answered to them and 26 said, "The man looked strong enough. That was the reason why 27 I wanted to bring him." So, that was what happened. 28 Q. Who asked you that? 29 Well, later when I got there I went to Superman and Α.

1 Superman told me that Isaac called him and told him that I had 2 wanted to bring a civilian. And he said to me that they had 3 passed a law and that should be a warning to me and any other 4 person that nobody should bring a civilian, and that they said they had passed a law that any civilians we come across we should 10:46:30 5 kill them and so that should be a warning. 6 7 Witness, you have been testifying about civilians who were 0. 8 captured and who were now with the troops in Kono. Did you have 9 women amongst those civilians? Yes, we had women. Women were there. Young women were 10:46:57 10 Α. 11 there, many. 12 Q. What were the age group of these women? 13 Α. Well, we had the young ones, we had those who were above 14 15, we had some who were 8, 10, 12, 15 and there were some who 10:47:21 15 were 20. They were young women, actually. Young women. 16 Q. What, if anything, happened to these women in Kono? 17 Well all of those women were living with various Α. commanders, both junior and senior SLA and RUF commanders. 18 Some 19 of them made them their wives. 10:47:48 20 Q. What do you mean by some of them made them their wives? 21 Well, even myself I had one that I captured in Kono. Α. She 22 was staying with me. And all the other commanders had. Even the 23 junior commanders had. When you say they were made wives, can you explain that? 24 Q. 10:48:14 25 How were women made wives? 26 Well, actually I did not marry mine and they themselves did Α. 27 not marry the ones that they had. We captured them, so whatever 28 they did we were forcing them to do it because we had guns. So, 29 that is what I mean.

1 Q. What is it that they did which they were forced to do? 2 Well we had sex with them, that was what was happening, Α. 3 because even some of them later went pregnant and they gave birth 4 to children for us. Now apart from having sex with them, did these women have 10:48:59 5 0. to do anything else? 6 7 Well, these women were responsible for cooking for us and Α. some of the men and some of the women helped to pound rice. 8 Some 9 were also responsible for laundry. Now, witness, these women who were taken as wives, what was 10:49:29 10 Q. their age groups? 11 12 Α. Well some were above 15, within those ages, 15, and some of 13 our SBUs had the younger ones who were around the ages of 10, 14 just like that. 10:49:58 15 Q. Witness, can you state the ages again - the age group - of 16 the women taken as wives? 17 Well like the one I had she was about 15/16 years, she was Α. very young, and I saw younger ones who were around 8, 10. Those 18 19 ones were taken by the SBU boys. They were with them. 10:50:30 20 Q. Now when you say "our SBUs had the younger ones", what do 21 you mean by that? 22 Well like I said the SBU, who were the Small Boys Unit, Α. they also will capture the younger ones when we went to capture 23 24 civilians. They will capture the younger ones and they will live 10:50:56 25 with them. 26 Q. Did they do anything with them? 27 Α. Well, in fact the SBUs were more desperate than us. They 28 also had sex with them. 29 How do you know this? Q.

	1	A. These are things I saw myself, because nobody stopped them
	2	because they had also become part of the movement.
	3	Q. Were the commanders aware of this?
	4	A. Yes, my Lord, they were aware but nobody did anything about
10:51:35	5	it. They told them, "Boys, enjoy yourselves." They said, "This
	6	is your own time."
	7	Q. Which commanders are you referring to who said this?
	8	A. The commanders that I was with and even the RUF commanders.
	9	Nobody disciplined anybody with regards those things.
10:51:58	10	Q. Witness, can you give us some names?
	11	A. Well, like I said, Bazzy did not say anything about that,
	12	Bomb Blast did not talk anything about that. Even Superman did
	13	not say anything against that. Nobody disciplined the young boys
	14	for those acts.
10:52:18	15	Q. Now this matter in relation to what happened to the women
	16	in Kono, what time frame was this taking place in?
	17	A. Well, this was after the battalions had been organised and
	18	it was within March, April, May, within all those periods.
	19	March, April, May, when we were in Kono those things were going
10:52:51	20	on, 1998.
	21	Q. Witness, you told us about civilians being killed during
	22	the attacks in these various towns and villages. Were there
	23	women amongst the civilians who were killed?
	24	A. Well, it was mixed, men, women, it was a random type of
10:53:31	25	killing. As long as you were not strong enough for us to bring
	26	you to be trained and that you were not beautiful, you would die.
	27	Q. Witness, during this period did you go to Gandorhun?
	28	A. Well, the only time I went to Gandorhun was the time we
	29	were preparing to go and recapture Koidu Geiya.
1 Q. When was this? 2 Well, it was after a communication that went on whilst we Α. were at headquarters when Superman sent to call Bazzy and Bomb 3 4 Blast and he said Mosquito had called and he wanted to talk to 10:54:38 5 them. Witness, I am going to pause there you. Your Honours, it's Q. 6 Koidu Geiya K-O-I-D-U, not Koindu. Witness, when you say 7 8 headquarter what are you referring to? 9 Α. Well, it is Masingbi Road, the headquarter that was there. How do you know that Superman sent for Bazzy and Bomb 10:55:01 10 Q. Blast? 11 12 Α. Well, I was present there. There was somebody, he had a 13 runner, somebody who was in charge of that at Masingbi Road. The 14 person came from Dabundeh Street and came to Masingbi Road and he 10:55:27 15 said that Superman wanted to talk with Bazzy and Bomb Blast, that 16 is Hassan Papa Bangura. 17 Q. What happened after this message was brought? Well, Hassan Papa Bangura together with Bazzy prepared 18 Α. 19 themselves, myself and others we all moved and we went to 10:55:54 20 Dabundeh Street to meet Superman. MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, Dabundeh is spelt 21 22 D-A-B-U-N-D-E-H, street: 23 0. Please proceed, witness. What happened when you moved to 24 Dabundeh Street and met with Superman? 10:56:14 25 Α. Well, when we met Superman and on our arrival Superman was 26 with the set and he was waiting for Mosquito's call and when we 27 arrived Mosquito called and he ordered Superman that now he has 28 got arms and ammunition and that we should go and get the 29 ammunition to recapture Koidu Geiya and he said men were coming

1 from as far as Kailahun so that we will continue to defend Koidu 2 Town since ECOMOG had gone over air and said they are in Makeni and heading to go to Koidu Town and he said we should use those 3 4 ammunition to fight to defend Koidu Town. Witness, you have spoken in your testimony so far about two 10:57:04 5 0. Mosquitos, one is a Lieutenant Mosquito and one is the RUF 6 7 commander, Sam Bockarie alias Mosquito. Which Mosquito was this 8 communication with? 9 Α. Well, this was General Mosquito, Sam Bockarie, who was the RUF commander at that time. 10:57:28 10 Now when he said that he has got arms and ammunition, who 11 Q. 12 said he has got arms and ammunition? 13 Well, it was Mosquito who said he has got ammunition from Α. 14 Liberia and he said he will want us to go and receive them since 10:57:54 15 ECOMOG is threatening that they are coming to recapture Koidu Town, so he said we should use that to repel them. 16 17 Q. During that communication did he say where in Liberia he 18 got the ammunition from? 19 MR ANYAH: Madam President, I don't recall hearing Liberia. 10:58:23 20 PRESIDING JUDGE: I heard Liberia. Just let me check the record, because I certainly have it in my notes. Yes, the 21 22 answer, Mr Anyah, "Well, it was Mosquito who said he had got 23 ammunition from Liberia and he said he will want us to go and 24 receive them since ECOMOG is threatening." That's how I heard 10:58:48 25 it, Mr Anyah. 26 I see it and I withdraw the objection. MR ANYAH: 27 PRESI DI NG JUDGE: Thank you. 28 MS ALAGENDRA: Witness, during that communication did Mosquito say where 29 Q.

	1	in Liberia he got the ammunition from?
	2	A. Well, what he told us was that, he said the President of
	3	Liberia had arranged and ammunitions have now arrived and that we
	4	should go and receive them.
10:59:19	5	Q. Did he state the name of that President of Liberia?
	6	A. Yes, he said President Taylor. He said President Taylor,
	7	he has organised for us to get arms and he has sent them and then
	8	we should go and collect them to go and defend Kono.
	9	Q. During this communication did anybody else speak over the
10:59:44	10	radi o?
	11	A. Well, after that also Issa spoke with Bomb Blast because
	12	that was his friend and he said, "Please, they should hold onto
	13	the ground" and he said also that very soon he would also come to
	14	Koidu in Kono.
11:00:07	15	Q. Hold which ground, did he say?
	16	A. Well, Kono. He said we should hold on Kono District strong
	17	and firm so that when the ammunitions come we will continue to
	18	defend there thoroughly.
	19	Q. Did anybody el se speak?
11:00:35	20	A. Morris Kallon also spoke to Bazzy and he also gave him
	21	encouraging words and he said they should be determined and he
	22	said he was also coming very soon to reinforce us.
	23	Q. Did he explain they should be determined for what?
	24	A. He said because ECOMOG had gone over the air and that they
11:01:07	25	were in Makeni and they were coming to recapture Kono. He said
	26	he was also coming to reinforce us so that we will fight and push
	27	ECOMOG back.
	28	Q. Now after this communication did Morris Kallon come to
	29	Kono?

1 Α. Yes, he later came to Kono. 2 Q. Did anything happen after this communication? Immediately after this communication Superman organised 3 Α. 4 men, Hassan Papa Bangura and Bazzy organised men and it was Hassan Papa Bangura who led them from Masingbi Road and we went 11:01:51 5 to Superman at Dabundeh Street and then we left, we used 6 7 Gandorhun route to go to Koidu Geiya. Witness, when you talk about Hassan Papa Bangura, Bazzy and 8 Q. 9 Superman organising men who are these men that you're talking about? 11:02:18 10 These were the immediate commanders in Koidu Town. 11 Α. 12 Superman was the overall, Bazzy was the commander for the 13 Masingbi Road area and Hassan Papa Bangura was the operations 14 commander and deputy commander. Witness, the men that were organised, who were those men? 11:02:34 15 0. Well, I was also part of it and together with the RUF and 16 Α. 17 the SLA, it was a combined force. 18 Q. You said you used the Masingbi Road to go to where? 19 To Superman at Dabundeh Street. We left Dabundeh Street Α. 11:03:18 20 and then we used the Gandorhun route. 21 0. And where did you go? 22 Well, we went through Koidu Buma. Α. To where? 23 0. 24 Α. And we attacked Koidu Geiya. 11:03:38 25 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, Koidu Buma is spelt B-U-M-A 26 for Buma: 27 Q. Did anything happen on the way to Koidu Geiya? 28 Α. Well, on our way whilst we were advancing Rambo was ahead. 29 That is the RUF Rambo. He was the deputy operations and he was

	1	the acting commander in Gandorhun. We met, he had already
	2	captured some civilians and he had hacked about 15 of them. He
	3	had hacked them, in Koidu Buma, to death.
	4	Q. How do you know this?
11:04:27	5	A. Well, I saw it myself.
	6	Q. At the time that you saw this
	7	JUDGE SEBUTINDE: Ms Alagendra, I'm not sure what he saw
	8	when he wasn't there. He was on his way when this happened.
	9	What exactly did he see?
11:04:52	10	THE WITNESS: The corpses that Rambo had hacked, because he
	11	was in the advance team, he had gone ahead with the advance team.
	12	So when he got there he waited for us and when I also got there
	13	I saw the corpses and I confirmed it and I knew that these were
	14	civilians that he had hacked to death.
11:05:14	15	MS ALAGENDRA:
	16	Q. How is it you know it was RUF Rambo who hacked these
	17	ci vi l i ans?
	18	A. He said it himself. He said he displayed with the men. He
	19	said he hacked them.
11:05:30	20	Q. What do you mean by, "He said he displayed with the men"?
	21	A. Well, the bodies were hacked. In fact they did not use
	22	weapons. They hacked them and they were displayed in the street.
	23	Q. Do you know why they were displayed?
	24	A. He said this was to create fear so that no civilians will
11:05:58	25	come to that area again.
	26	Q. At the time he was saying this to you where were the
	27	commanders that you went with?
	28	A. Well, when we all arrived at the point they all stopped and
	29	we all waited and all of them took notice of it and all the

	1	commanders were eager to know whether it was as a result of an
	2	attack or what. But then he himself explained what happened.
	3	Q. Witness, can you name those commanders again, please?
	4	A. Well, Hassan Papa Bangura was there, Superman was there and
11:06:45	5	those were the two senior commanders that went with us.
	6	Q. How far is Koidu Buma from Koidu Geiya?
	7	A. Almost about three to five miles, about that.
	8	Q. And you said that the group eventually arrived at Koidu
	9	Geiya, is that correct?
11:07:12	10	A. We launched an attack on Koidu Geiya and finally we were
	11	able to recapture Koidu Geiya from the Kamajors.
	12	Q. Can you describe what happened in Koidu Geiya?
	13	A. Well, when we arrived at Koidu Geiya we captured two
	14	Kamajors and one amongst them, one of our men called Ahchebe, he
11:07:52	15	had to slit open one of that Kamajor's stomach and he took out
	16	his heart and he started chewing it raw. So since that day each
	17	and every one of us started calling him Charma'raw. We gave him
	18	the name Charma'raw.
	19	MS ALAGENDRA: I am going to ask the witness to assist us
11:08:17	20	with the spelling of these names, your Honour:
	21	Q. Witness, the name you called out Ahchebe, was that the name
	22	you said?
	23	A. Yes, Ahchebe, yes.
	24	Q. Can you spell that for us?
11:08:28	25	A. A-H-C-H-E-B-E.
	26	Q. You said Charma'raw?
	27	A. Well, that is a Krio word. That is when you eat something
	28	raw. In Krio we call it Charma'raw. It is a Krio spelling.
	29	Q. Will you be able to spell it?

1 Α. C-H-A-R-M-A-'-R-A-W. 2 Q. What happened after this? 3 Superman went angry with him. He told him that he never Α. 4 liked that kind of idea. He said to bring cannibalism in the operation is not good. So he was angry with him, but he did not 11:09:29 5 actually do anything to him. He only warned him. He asked him 6 7 not to do that again. Did he explain why he didn't like the idea of cannibalism? 8 0. 9 Α. Well, he said if Ahchebe had started this kind of action, tomorrow if we run out of food then we will start eating human 11:09:53 10 beings. He said he wouldn't like that. 11 12 Q. Did he say anything else? Like I said, he just warned him. He said he will not 13 Α. 14 encourage that kind of thing. He said the next time he did that, he will be harsh with him. 11:10:24 15 When he said, "If we run out of food then we will start 16 Q. 17 eating human beings", was he specific about any category of human 18 beings that will be eaten if you ran out of food? 19 He said, "well, if you have done this, the next time if you Α. 11:10:52 20 don't eat your fellow soldier you will eat civilians", so that 21 was the reason why he asked him to stop that. 22 You said Koidu Geiya was captured, is that correct? 0. 23 Α. Yes, my Lord. 24 Q. What happened after that? 11:11:21 25 Α. Well, after that we waited for some time and then the troops that left Kailahun came with the ammunition. 26 27 Q. Which troops? 28 Α. The combined troop that came from Kailahun. That is SLAs 29 mixed with RUF. They arrived with the ammunition.

1 Q. How do you know that the troop was coming from Kailahun? 2 Α. Like I said earlier, Mosquito had told Superman in my 3 presence and the other two commanders that ammunition had arrived 4 and that he was releasing a troop to come and we should capture Koidu Geiya so that they will bring this ammunition and give it 11:12:24 5 to us, then we will defend Koidu Town. 6 7 This ammunition that came from Kailahun that you saw, do 0. 8 you know where it came from? 9 Α. Well, the way I came to know that these arms came from a specific place, because there were boxes of AK rounds, 60 11:12:53 10 millimetre mortars, RPGs and we saw them, they were in green 11 12 boxes and it was written on them AFL, Armed Forces of Liberia, 13 and these were clearly written on them. AFL, Armed Forces of 14 Liberia. 11:13:13 15 Q. Witness, can you repeat again the type of ammunition. You said AK rounds, 60 millimetre - can you finish that? 16 17 Α. 60 millimetre bombs, mortar bombs. What happened to this ammunition once it arrived? 18 Q. 19 Well, they were under the full control of Superman. Α. 11:13:44 20 0. Did he do anything with it? 21 Well, they loaded them on board a vehicle and then later Α. 22 when we arrived in Koidu Town they distributed them and that was 23 the time the ECOMOG had started their advance. 24 Q. Who distributed the ammunition? 11:14:08 25 Α. Well, before that happened and whilst we were at Koidu 26 Geiya we saw Eldred Collins and then they also called - we also 27 saw Mammy Sankoh, that is Sankoh's wife. When they came they 28 told us that ECOMOG has started bombing Koidu Town and then we decided to go back there. And we had looted some money from the 29

1 bank in Kono and even that day they had decided that they should 2 be on their way to take them to Kailahun. These were bags of money, over six bags of money. So as a result of this news that 3 4 we had from Eldred Collins we left and we went to Koidu Town. Witness, who made the decision about the bags of money? 11:15:02 5 0. Well, actually the earlier moment we were in Kono, myself, 6 Α. 7 Superman, together with Bomb Blast, we went to a bank that was in 8 Kono. They gave us information that there was money. We went, 9 we broke into the bank and we took the monies. So the money was with Superman, but when --11:15:39 10

THE INTERPRETER: Your Honours, could the witness go over that area, please. He was going too fast.

13 PRESIDING JUDGE: Mr Witness, the interpreter found that 14 you were going too fast. Could you repeat your answer, please. 11:15:56 15 Pick up where - you have already said, "They gave us information that there was money. We went and broke into the bank and took 16 17 the money, the money was with Superman." Continue from there. THE WITNESS: The money was with Superman, but when we 18 19 moved to Koidu Geiya and we captured there and whilst the ECOMOG 11:16:24 20 jet was bombarding Koidu Town, like I said, we saw Eldred Collins 21 Mammy Sankoh and others, they came. So they had this money on 22 them, about six bags of money. So from there Superman said that 23 Mosquito has called and asked for the money. So we left the 24 money in care of the same people and they took it to Kailahun. 11:16:53 25 So when they left, myself, Superman, Bomb Blast, Rambo, we left 26 Koidu Geiya and then we moved back to Koidu Town. 27 Witness, you are talking about ECOMOG jet was bombarding Q. 28 Koidu Town. Before the ECOMOG jet actually started bombarding

29 Koidu Town did you know that they were going to bombard Koidu

1 Town? 2 Α. Well, it was Mosquito who called and that was after we had 3 returned and through monitoring we came to understand that the 4 jet 448, because that was how they used to call it, it was moving to come and bombard Koidu Town as ECOMOG were en route to enter 11:17:46 5 there. 6 7 0. Could you explain your answer, please. You said it was Mosquito who called and that was after we had returned. After 8 9 you had returned from where? We left Koidu Geiya to go to Koidu Town. 11:18:11 10 Α. What do you mean by, "Through monitoring we came to 11 Q. 12 understand that the jet 448", what does that mean? 13 Α. Well, on the radio set we had a continuous monitoring of 14 all activities, but on our arrival in Koidu Town Superman later 11:18:45 15 called Bomb Blast, that is Hassan Papa Bangura, and he went to meet him at Dabundeh Street. He said that he had got a call from 16 17 Mosquito that ECOMOG were on their way, that they were advancing towards Sewafe. 18 19 Did he explain how Mosquito knew that, that ECOMOG were on 0. 11:19:08 20 their way? 21 Yes, he said he got information from Liberia that he had Α. 22 monitored from Liberia that the ECOMOG forces were moving now, 23 that the 448 was moving, because we later understood that it was 24 from Liberia that the ECOMOG Alpha Jet was moving from. He said 11:19:30 25 that they were moving to come and bombard Koidu Town. So he said 26 we should prepare to go and destroy the Sewafe bridge. 27 Q. Witness, do you know who in Liberia Mosquito got this 28 information from, or how he got this information? 29 Well, all what he said, he said he got it from President Α.

1 Taylor. He said he got information from President Taylor that 2 the ECOMOG forces were moving and that they were advancing to capture Koidu Town. 3 4 Q. What is 448? That was the Alpha Jet, because that was the code that we 11:20:17 5 Α. used on the radio set when communication was going on. They will 6 7 say that the 448 had left, so all the areas that monitored, that was what they will understand. 8 9 0. Who would say the 448 has left? That was what Mosquito said, that he had got information 11:20:35 10 Α. from President Taylor that the 448 had left and it was coming to 11 12 attack positions in Koidu Town. Was it only on this occasion that you heard communication 13 Q. 14 relating to 448 and the way you described it? 11:21:03 15 Α. Well, actually when we went to Koidu Town we never used to have jet raids, but it was at the time that it started and it was 16 17 through monitoring and at any time we monitored he would pass the word that the 448 had left. 18 19 Who would pass the word that 448 had left? 0. 11:21:30 20 Α. Well, it was through monitoring and whenever Superman got 21 it he would send it to SAJ Musa in Koinadugu and he also will 22 send it to the other bases about the 448 and each and everybody will disguise. Everybody will leave the town and go to the bush. 23 24 Q. And this information relating to 448, did it only come from 11:21:57 25 Li beri a? 26 Α. Well, that was the only source through which we got 27 information about the ECOMOG movement. That is, the movement of 28 the 448, the movement of the jet. PRESIDING JUDGE: I am not entirely clear on that answer. 29

1 That was the only source. We have been told about a radio and 2 the monitoring on the radio. Does the only source mean the 3 radio, or from Liberia, because you were very specific in your 4 question, Ms Alagendra? MS ALAGENDRA: 11:22:38 5 Witness, when you say, "The only source through which we Q. 6 7 got information" what is the only source that you are talking about? 8 9 Α. Well, it was through the communication from Liberia to Mosquito that the information will circulate that the 448 had 11:22:52 10 left. That was how we got the information. After that everybody 11 12 would disguise. We would all leave the town and then we will go 13 to sokoin and what we call sokoin was hide outs. 14 PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you, I am clear now. 11:23:18 15 MS ALAGENDRA: I will need some assistance in spelling that I am not sure if it is the witness or the interpreter. 16 word. 17 Perhaps I will ask the witness: 18 Witness, can you repeat that word please, sokoin? Q. 19 This is a Mende word. These were hiding places, like the Α. 11:23:37 20 forest areas where we will go and hide, they call it sokoin. It 21 is S-O-K-O-I-N, sokoin. 22 JUDGE SEBUTINDE: The witness kept saying, "We would 23 disguise" meaning what? 24 MS ALAGENDRA: 11:23:59 25 Q. Witness, can you explain what you meant by that? 26 Well, immediately the information went around that the 448 Α. 27 was coming, myself, that is the SLA, the RUF and the other 28 civilians, we called them family members, that was how we called 29 them, we would withdraw from the houses and then we would go to

1 the bush, because when the 448 came it would target the houses, 2 so we would all go to the bush. 3 Witness, describe what you mean by - or, rather, explain Q. what you mean by family members? Who are family members? 4 This was a code that we used. All captured civilians were 11:24:45 5 Α. called family members, so when they said that 448 was coming they 6 7 will say, "Move the family members" and those were the captured civilians that we had. We called them family members. 8 Those 9 were the codes that we used. Who would say, "Move the family members"? You said they? 11:25:12 10 Q. Well, the commanders, myself and all the others, RUF, SLA, 11 Α. 12 we will say to move them because we strictly protected them for 13 them not to escape. 14 Q. After this operation in Koidu Geiya did you go anywhere? Well, we undertook an operation to put down the bridge at 11:25:40 15 Α. 16 Sewafe. 17 Q. When did this operation take place? Just like I said, that Mosquito had called us and told us 18 Α. 19 that ECOMOG were on the advance and he told Superman that we 11:26:11 20 should organise and go to the Sewafe bridge and try to put it 21 down. 22 What happened after Mosquito said that to Superman? 0. Well, the troop prepared. We prepared and then we went to 23 Α. 24 ensure that we put down Sewafe bridge. 11:26:46 25 Q. Did you go to Sewafe bridge? Yes, I together with Superman, Bomb Blast and the others, 26 Α. 27 we moved to the Sewafe bridge. 28 Q. When did this happen in terms of time? 29 Well, it was around May, mid-May or so, because at that Α.

1 time we were now preparing for any attack from ECOMOG. 2 Q. What happened during this operation? 3 Well, we went with one D-8 Caterpillar or bulldozer to Α. 4 bring down the bridge, but the operator ran away, so we did not bring down the bridge. The only thing, we created an obstacle. 11:27:41 5 We dug the bridge seriously so that no vehicle will be able to 6 7 pass through there. Who was digging the bridge? 8 Q. 9 Α. I, together with the RUF and the SLA that went to that ground. 11:28:02 10 PRESIDING JUDGE: I am just watching the time, 11 12 Ms Alagendra. We have been told there are about two minutes, so is this a convenient time for you? 13 MS ALAGENDRA: Yes, it would be, your Honour. 14 11:28:15 15 PRESIDING JUDGE: Very well. Mr Witness, we are now taking the mid-morning break. We will resume court again at 12 o'clock. 16 17 Please adjourn court until 12. 18 [Break taken at 11.30 a.m.] 19 [Upon resuming at 12.00 p.m.] 11:59:46 20 PRESIDING JUDGE: Ms Al agendra? 21 MS ALAGENDRA: Thank you, your Honour: 22 Witness, before the break we stopped at where you were 0. 23 describing what was taking place during the Sewafe bridge 24 operation and you were telling the Court that obstacles were 12:00:09 25 being created by the SLA and RUF who were digging around the 26 bridge. Do you remember that? 27 Α. Yes, my Lord. 28 Q. Now during this operation at Sewafe bridge can you tell us 29 if there were any RUF members present?

1 Α. Yes, my Lord. 2 Q. Do you recall who they were? 3 Commander Isaac Mongor was among, Superman and also junior Α. commanders of the RUF and the SLA were there. 4 Who led this operation? 12:01:00 5 0. Well, Superman was the overall commander for this Α. 6 7 operation. Q. How did the operation end? 8 9 Α. Well, we were not able to demolish the bridge, but we created an obstacle. We dug the bridge, we created holes in the 12:01:19 10 bridge. 11 12 Q. Did anything else happen? 13 Α. Well, after that we tried to ensure that we blocked the bridge, but we were unable. So we withdrew from that area. 14 12:01:45 15 0. Where did you withdraw to? Well, we came back to Masingbi Road. 16 Α. 17 Q. What did you see when you came back to Masingbi Road? Well, I think I have left something out because I have 18 Α. 19 recalled and that is going back to - after the operation from 12:02:10 20 Koi du Gei ya. 21 0. Please tell us, witness, what you forgot? 22 Okay. Well, after we had arrived from Koidu Geiya we met Α. 23 Bazzy had burnt down the entire Masingbi Road. The residence where we were and where he was had all been burnt down and we 24 12:02:40 25 raised an objection that he should have waited for us because we 26 had some things in there. So we had to move to the Five-Five 27 On arrival from Koidu Geiya, Gullit had arrived. That is Spot. 28 Tamba Alex Brima. Morris Kallon too had come. Gullit came with 29 some rice, oil and drinks and alcohol - [indiscernible] alcohol.

1 Q. Where was he coming from, Gullit? 2 Well, he came from Kailahun according to him when he Α. 3 explained to us. You said he came with some rice, oil, alcohol, do you know 4 Q. 12:03:49 5 where he got those from? Well, he said they were given to him by Mosquito because he Α. 6 7 told Mosquito that since some dispute was going around he would 8 be able to settle those disputes, so he said he was coming to be 9 an advisor so that those little disputes would be settled. 12:04:13 10 Q. What disputes are you referring to? Well, we had some problems with Morris Kallon in Kono when 11 Α. 12 at one time he went and shot two SLAs. That caused some 13 friction. We said he shouldn't have done that. So it was Gullit 14 who came and said he had told Mosquito that he would be able to 12:04:46 15 put the situation under control. That was why he was released to come from Kailahun. 16 17 Q. Do you know why Morris Kallon shot these two SLAs? Yes, my Lord. 18 Α. 19 Where? 0. 12:05:02 20 Α. Well, at one time we had a short muster at Masingbi Road, 21 so Morris Kallon came and said that was not supposed to happen 22 because we hadn't two factions. Whatever muster was taking place, it should be only one, so nobody else should call a muster 23 24 around that area. So he said people should go towards Tankoro 12:05:30 25 police station. He said that was where all of us were to muster. 26 Whilst this was going on I and the other men were going, 27 one of the men who was called Four-Four, Mohamed but we called 28 him Four-Four, he and one Alhaji Borbor, but we used to call him Alhaji, they went to drink somewhere and Morris Kallon said they 29

had disobeyed him. He shot him. He shot Four-Four on his leg
and Alhaji, he shot him through his throat. We even called him
Alhaji Burst Throat.

4 Q. Witness, you said, "At one time we had a short muster at Masingbi Road." Who had a short muster at Masingbi Road? 12:06:15 5 Well, it was just that when the ECOMOG was advancing it was Α. 6 7 just a muster to address the RUF and SLA together with Bazzy, 8 Bomb Blast, all of us were together. So it was just because 9 Bazzy had just said he wanted to encourage people - encourage us to withstand ECOMOG. But when Morris Kallon came he was angry 12:06:40 10 and said that should not happen. He said we only had one 11 command; whatever was happening, the command should have been 12 13 coming from Mosquito to Superman and then to us.

14 MR ANYAH: Madam President, can we get some time frames for 12:06:58 15 the shooting of the SLAs and perhaps the muster as well? PRESIDING JUDGE: Indeed. If we could deal with that, 16 17 please, Ms Alagendra. MS ALAGENDRA: Indeed I will deal with that first before I 18 19 continue on the details: Witness, when did that take place? 12:07:12 20 0. Well, it was just after the arrival - after the arrival of 21 Α. 22 Morris Kallon in Koidu Town. That was around June - I mean, 23 sorry, May/June, within those times, 1998. 24 Q. The shooting of the SLAs, when did that take place? 12:07:34 25 Α. It was within that time frame that I have talked about. 26 That was when that happened. 27 Q. Now when Morris Kallon said we had only one command, who is 28 the we that he was talking about? 29 That is Superman was the overall commander there. He said Α.

	3	Q. The muster that had taken place, who had called that

	14	PRESIDING JUDGE: Just a moment, Ms Alagendra. If I recall
12:09:09	15	correctly, Mr Anyah also raised the timing of the shooting.
	16	MS ALAGENDRA: The witness has addressed that, your Honour.
	17	He said it was the same time frame.
	18	PRESIDING JUDGE: I see, thank you.
	19	MS ALAGENDRA:
12:09:23	20	Q. Witness, talking about radio communications taking place
	21	whilst you were in Kono, do you know how many radio sets were
	22	there in Kono at the time?
	23	A. Well, all we knew was that there was one central radio set
	24	which was controlled by Superman. The set which we had was for
12:09:50	25	monitoring. We were not doing any other communication. It was
	26	Superman who had a set. Whenever any information came, it came -
	27	he will call Bazzy and Bomb Blast who will go there. We only had
	28	a monitoring set at Masingbi Road.
	29	Q. Who is the "we" that you are talking about?

1 I am talking about Bazzy, Bomb Blast and the troops that Α. 2 were at Masingbi Road. Now, the group that was under Bazzy, do you know if there 3 Q. 4 was any reason why the group was not doing any communication, but only monitoring? 12:10:30 5 Well, as I had earlier said, all orders and commands, the Α. 6 7 troops received from Superman, so whatever communication we had was from Superman. They only gave us the monitoring set - sorry, 8 9 they gave the Masingbi Road. Why was there no communication taking place from the radio 12:10:59 10 Q. at Masingbi Road? 11 12 Α. Well, this was an order from Superman: That no other place 13 should have a communication set, except a monitoring set. 14 Q. Now, you have talked about Morris Kallon coming to Koidu 12:11:24 15 Town. When was that? Well, it was just before - after the Koidu Geiya operation 16 Α. 17 that he arrived. That was when Morris Kallon arrived. Now, did anything happen in relation to the command 18 Q. 19 structure that was in place in Kono when Morris Kallon arrived? 12:11:51 20 Well, when Morris Kallon arrived Bazzy - sorry, Superman Α 21 called Bazzy and told him that Morris Kallon had come and he will 22 become an adviser. He will be there to advise in Koidu Town. He 23 will be there as an adviser for the troop. 24 Q. And when Gullit came, did this effect the command structure that was in place in Kono at any time? 12:12:21 25 26 Yes, automatically when Gullit came at Five-Five Spot Bazzy Α. 27 handed over command. So he became the commander for the Masingbi 28 axis, The Masingbi Road axis. 29 Who was immediately subordinate to Gullit? Q.

1 Well, Bazzy was subordinate to him. Α.

2 Q. Can you give us a time frame when Gullit came to Koidu 3 Town?

4 Α. Well, like I said, it was within June, around June, yes, because it was just a short time before I and them withdrew 12:13:07 5 finally from Kono when ECOMOG came in, 1998. 6

7 Now, witness, going back to what took place after the 0. operation at the Sewafe bridge, can you tell us where you went? 8 9 Α. Well, after the operation we came back to Masingbi Road sorry, Five-Five Spot, because we had left Masingbi Road and we 12:13:41 10 were now at Five-Five Spot. Gullit, that is Tamba Alex Brima, 11 12 called a short meeting together with Ibrahim Bazzy, Hassan Papa 13 Bangura and other commanders. They briefed us that now when he 14 went to Kailahun Mosquito took all the diamonds from him. He 12:14:14 15 said but because of the incident that had happened between himself and Morris Kallon, that was why Mosquito released him 16 17 with some logistics to come and advise the two sides. They said but he was advising that now that the ECOMOG was piling pressure 18 19 we should withdraw immediately to Tombodu, from there to head for 12:14:39 20 Koi nadugu. That is Koinadugu District where SAJ Musa was based 21 in Mongo Bendugu.

22 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, I am just having a look at the record and here it says they "believed" us, but what I heard 23 24 coming from the witness is he "briefed" us.

12:14:56 25

PRESIDING JUDGE: I heard that too. These matters are 26 usually picked up when the transcript is checked from the tape, 27 Ms Al agendra.

28 MS ALAGENDRA: Thank you, your Honour:

Q. Witness, during the time that the SLA and the RUF were 29

1 based in Kono, were there any particular activities going on? 2 Well, as far as I can recall we had mining going on during Α. 3 our stay in Koidu Town. 4 Q. What kind of mining? Well, it was diamond mining. Well, the area where we were, 12:15:41 5 Α. where I and Hassan Papa Bangura were, and Bazzy were, at Masingbi 6 7 Road, we had a place around Five-Five Spot which was a good area 8 where people said diamonds were. They were mining there. 9 0. Apart from this place, do you know in which other areas diamond mining was going on in Kono? 12:16:14 10 Yes, Tombodu al so. 11 Α. 12 Q. Any other place? 13 Α. Well, this was the area because it was an organised mining 14 wherein no other person was allowed to mine, except through the 12:16:38 15 supervision of Superman, Morris Kallon and other commanders whom they will appoint to do the mining. But these two areas were the 16 17 ones I knew about: The Masingbi Road area and Tombodu. Now, who was doing the actual mining of the diamonds? 18 Q. 19 Well, this was done by the captured civilians whom the Α. 12:17:08 20 troops had - the SLA and the RUF had in Kono. 21 0. Why is it that the civilians were doing the mining? 22 Well, since they were captured civilians and they were Α. 23 under gunpoint they were forced to do it. 24 Q. They were under whose gunpoint? 12:17:35 25 Α. Well, it is both the RUF and the SLA that was based at 26 Masingbi Road and the Tombodu axis. 27 Q. Do you know which of the RUF commanders were involved in 28 this diamond mining going on in Kono? 29 Well, Superman was one of the commanders who was going Α.

1 around monitoring the diamond mining areas, like that Tombodu 2 We also had Morris Kallon and Issa Sesay had his men who area. 3 were representing him, because he had representatives at the 4 various grounds, whereas Bazzy and Hassan Papa Bangura were doing secret mining which was not to the knowledge of Superman. 12:18:24 5 They did that at night. 6 7 Who was doing the mining for Hassan Papa Bangura and Bazzy? 0. 8 Α. It was the civilians whom were captured together with the 9 men who were at Masingbi Road. They were doing it. Witness, in Tombodu are you able to say the number of 12:18:51 10 Q. civilians that were doing the mining? 11 12 Α. No. Well, when we go and visit, mostly on patrols in the 13 night, you will see Superman with his men. I can't tell you the 14 number of civilians, but it was in a big pit and so you will see 12:19:16 15 the civilians down there doing the work because they had what they call tripping. They will clear the top soil, get rid of the 16 17 water and excavate the gravel and wash the gravel. Who is "they"? That "they" will clear the top soil and get 18 Q. 19 rid of the water, who is "they"? 12:19:43 20 Well, this was done by the civilians, the captured Α 21 civilians who were in the hands of the RUF and the SLA. They 22 were the ones doing the mining. MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, just to go back a little bit 23 24 there was a place that was named by the witness, Mongo Bendugu, 12:20:00 25 M-O-N-G-O-R, Bendugu is B-E-N-D-U-G-U: 26 Q. Witness, where is Mongo Bendugu? 27 Well, Mongo Bendugu is in the Koinadugu District. Α. 28 Q. Witness, after this meeting that you were talking about 29 where Gullit had said the SLAs should go up and join SAJ Musa,

1 what happened? 2 Well, after this meeting we received a lot of pressure from Α. 3 the ECOMOG forces as they were rapidly advancing towards Koidu, 4 so Superman called for an operation to repel the ECOMOG forces. He distributed some ammunition for us to go and repel the ECOMOG 12:21:06 5 advances. 6 7 Do you know which was the ammunition that he was 0. distributing? 8 9 Α. Yes, my Lord. The ammunition which we got - which we had taken from Koidu Geiya, those were the ammunition that he was 12:21:26 10 distributing to each and every one of us. 11 12 Q. Is this the ammunition you testified earlier came in boxes 13 labelled "AFL"? 14 Α. Yes, my Lord. Those were the ammunition. 12:21:44 15 Q. Who did Superman distribute this ammunition to? He gave to Bazzy, Bomb Blast and the entire troop that was 16 Α. 17 going to fight, the RUF and the SLAs. 18 Q. The entire troop that was going to fight the RUF and the 19 SLAs? 12:22:11 20 Α. It was a combined troop, combined forces. The RUF and the 21 SLA, both senior and junior commanders. 22 Who were they going to fight? 0. 23 Well, since we had received information that the ECOMOG Α. 24 forces were rapidly advancing towards Koidu Town, we were going 12:22:35 25 to attack them. 26 Q. Is this the 448 information that you were talking about 27 earlier? 28 MR ANYAH: I will object to the leading. PRESIDING JUDGE: Yes, that is a leading question, 29

1 Ms Alagendra. Please rephrase it.

2 MS ALAGENDRA:

3 Q. What is the information that you received?

A. As I said earlier, when Mosquito had called and alerted us
12:23:13
at the time ECOMOG forces were rapidly advancing on Koidu, based
on information - after we had demolished the bridge we were still
having threats. They were using long range missiles that was
landing into Koidu Town. So we prepared to advance again to stop
them.

12:23:47 10 Q. Witness, what happened after this?

A. Well, after this I, together with Superman, Hassan Papa
Bangura and the team, the RUF and the SLA, moved towards the
Sewafe bridge, but indeed the ECOMOG engineers enabled them to
cross - to go across and so we withdrew gradually to return.

12:24:22 15 Q. To return to where?

A. Well, since the ECOMOG were using heavy weaponry, they had
tanks and ammo cars, we did some tactical withdrawal. We will
shoot and withdraw. We will shoot and withdraw.

19 Q. Where did you withdraw to?

12:24:47 20 A. Well, we came as far as Koidu Town and went back towards 21 towards Dabundeh Street and to our surprise we found all the
22 remaining houses on fire where Superman was based. Superman's
23 base, his headquarters, we met the place burning.
24 Q. Do you know who was responsible for burning the place?

- Q. Do you know who was responsible for burning the place?
  12:25:20
  A. Well, Superman was based there with his men, but when we
  withdrew and found the place burning --
  - 27 Q. Yes?

A. -- well, they - it was the RUF, from the information that
we received from one of them who was around there that they had

1 left. Superman and the other men have moved with their families 2 towards Gandorhun. What happened after that? 3 Q. 4 Α. Well, from there I, Hassan Papa Bangura and some of the men with us, we moved directly to Tombodu. 12:26:01 5 Can you give us a time frame when you moved to Tombodu? Q. 6 7 Well, this was around May/June. June 1998. June 1998. Α. 8 JUDGE SEBUTINDE: Sorry, Ms Alagendra, did you get an 9 answer to the question who was responsible for burning the place? MS ALAGENDRA: Yes, your Honour. 12:26:27 10 JUDGE SEBUTINDE: And you are satisfied with the answer 11 12 that you got? MS ALAGENDRA: He said it was, "They, the RUF, from the 13 14 information we received from one of them who was around there that they had left." For me it is page 69, line 8: 12:26:38 15 Witness, apart from Dabundeh Street, were there any other 16 Q. 17 areas were houses were being burnt in Koidu Town at this time? 18 Well, the only thing was that the remaining houses while I Α. 19 and Hassan Papa Bangura were withdrawing, we were setting them on 12:27:21 20 fire up to Tombodu. We set fire to them because obviously we 21 knew that the RUF had withdrawn, we too were withdrawing. 22 0. Are you able to estimate that during this withdrawal how 23 many houses were being burnt? 24 No, I can't, because as we were moving the remaining houses Α. 12:27:44 25 - because Koidu Town really when you go there you would notice 26 the burning. As we were moving along we did the burning. I 27 cannot estimate the number of houses. 28 Q. Now, witness, you were talking about diamond mining earlier in Kono. The diamonds that were mined, do you know what happened 29

1 to them? 2 Well, it was under the direct control of Superman. That Α. 3 was what he told us; that as he received order from above he will 4 take them. He was in control of those diamonds. I did not know what he did with them. They called them government property. 12:28:27 5 They said this was government property. Whether you had money or 6 7 diamond it was a government property. Just to clarify the answer you have given, "order from 8 Q. 9 above", do you know who was the above he was referring to? 12:28:48 10 Α. Well, he was receiving orders from Mosquito. All the mining orders were coming from Mosquito. 11 12 Q. And you say they called them government property. Who 13 called them, the diamonds, government property? 14 Α. Well, this - I heard this name in the jungle, government 12:29:09 15 property, be it diamond, gold or any valuable, including money, dollars, pound sterling, they belonged to the government, that is 16 17 the RUF organisation. How do you know that? 18 Q. 19 Well, this used to happen in my presence. It happened --Α. 12:29:41 20 0. Did you finish your answer, Mr Witness? Did you want to 21 say something? 22 No, the mic went off. It used to happen in my presence, Α. 23 whenever the mining was going on Superman used to receive all the 24 stocks intact. 12:29:58 25 Q. What stocks? 26 The diamonds, because he will call Bazzy, Bomb Blast and Α. 27 say these stocks are going back to Kailahun to Mosquito so 28 logistics, arms and ammunitions used to arrive and he will say 29 these are the stocks we are sending back to them from which we

1 were getting the logistics, arms and ammunition. 2 Q. Witness, can you clarify your answer, please. You are 3 saying, "The diamonds, because he will call Bazzy, Bomb Blast and 4 say these stocks are going back to Kailahun to Mosquito so logistics, arms and ammunitions used to arrive" and you say you 12:30:40 5 are referring to diamonds when you say "stocks"? 6 7 Yes, the diamonds that used to come which Superman used to Α. receive, but when the commanders were concerned Superman will 8 9 call them for whatever quantity of diamonds that he received, he 12:31:01 10 will call them and show to them that these are the diamonds we are sending and we will get our logistical support, our arms and 11 12 ammunition for the troop. He said these diamonds were going 13 directly to Mosquito. 14 Q. And did he say what Mosquito was doing with these diamonds? 12:31:25 15 Α. Well, just as I said, he said it was from these that Mosquito got arms and ammunition through Liberia. 16 17 Q. Did he say through who in Liberia? Well, through President Taylor in Liberia. 18 Α. 19 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, I would like the witness to be 12:31:53 20 shown a map and this is in the map book provided by the 21 Prosecution. Your Honours, I am specifically referring to the 22 map of the Kono District. 23 PRESIDING JUDGE: Mr Anyah, do you have this with you? 24 MR ANYAH: Yes, Madam President. 12:32:27 25 MS ALAGENDRA: Which is at the page numbered S11, your 26 Honour. You will find that in the bottom left-hand corner: 27 Q. Witness, do you have the map of Kono District in front of 28 you? 29 Α. Yes, my Lord.

1 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, with the permission of the 2 Court I would like to ask the witness to mark some locations. 3 PRESIDING JUDGE: Yes, please proceed. Has the witness got 4 something to mark with? And it might help us if we could have it on the overhead, please. 12:33:33 5 MS ALAGENDRA: Also, your Honour, how I propose to proceed 6 7 is to ask the witness to circle the locations and put a number next to it and that number will reflect what place each number 8 9 stands for. PRESIDING JUDGE: Well, let's try it and if it proves to be 12:33:50 10 impractical or there's a problem I am sure Mr Anyah or one of the 11 12 learned colleagues will indicate. 13 JUDGE SEBUTINDE: Could the witness perhaps circle the copy 14 that is on the overhead so that we simultaneously follow. 12:34:10 15 MS ALAGENDRA: Yes, your Honour, that is what I was thinking was going to be done. Perhaps if the witness would like 16 17 to move closer to the map: Witness, I am going to ask you to circle some of the 18 Q. 19 locations in Kono District which you have mentioned during your 12:35:00 20 testimony, so what I am going to do is ask you to circle the place and put a number next to it starting from number 1. Did 21 22 you understand that? 23 Α. Yes, my Lord. 24 Q. Witness, can you mark where Koidu Town is? 12:35:38 25 Α. Yes, my Lord. 26 Q. Please do so and can you put a number 1 next to that. Your 27 Honours, just to check with the Court Attendant if the number is 28 visible clearly? MS IRURA: I will ask him to make it a bit darker. 29

1 MS ALAGENDRA: 2 Q. Witness, you spoke about a village which Johnny Paul Koroma 3 went to and that village was in between Woama and Tankoro. Do 4 you see Woama on the map? Yes, my Lord. 12:37:05 5 Α. Can you mark - can you circle it, please, and write number Q. 6 7 2 next to that. Do you see Tankoro on the map? Α. 8 Yes, my Lord. 9 0. Can you circle it and put a number 3 next to that. You have said that the place Sewafe that you have been testifying 12:37:59 10 about is also known as Njaiama Sewafe. Do you recall that? 11 12 Α. Yes, my Lord. 13 Q. Do you see Njaiama Sewafe on this map? 14 Α. Yes, my Lord. 12:38:16 15 Can you circle it and put a number 4 next to that. You Q. have testified about a place call Gandorhun. Do you see that on 16 17 the map? Yes, my Lord. 18 Α. 19 Can you circle that and put a number 5 next to it. You 0. 12:39:20 20 have testified about a place called Jagbwema Fiama. Witness, you earlier told us what family members meant. 12:45:38 5 0. Could you tell us again, please, at this point. When you say 6 7 family members, who are you referring to? I said that these were the civilians who I and the other 8 Α 9 people captured who were under our command, both the RUF and the SLAs that were in that area, those whom we had captured. 12:46:02 10 At this point when you withdrew to Tombodu, what was the 11 Q. 12 number of the captured civilians that your group moved with to 13 Tombodu? 14 Α. Well, the number was large. The number was large, because most of them who continued to be with us at the base, we ensured 12:46:26 15 that, like I said, we protected them so that nobody will escape. 16 17 They continued to stay with us. About 200 of them were with us. These roughly 200 civilians, where were they captured from? 18 Q. 19 Well, some of them were captured in Makeni and some in Kono Α. 12:46:55 20 where we were based. 21 Witness, you testified earlier about the ammunition that 0. 22 was distributed by Superman to Bazzy and Bomb Blast. At this 23 point in Tombodu, were there any left? 24 Α. Well, we had got this ammunitions before, like I said, to 12:47:25 25 repel the ECOMOG forces. When we withdrew we still had this 26 ammunition. 27 Q. How long were you and the group you were with in Tombodu? 28 Α. Well, I cannot say, because it was a mixed group, because a 14 Α. few of the SLAs that came, I knew them, but others I did not - I 13:06:40 15 was unable to identify them. 16 17 Q. How did you know that there was RUF in that group? 18 Well, Five-Five did say that to Gullit. I also got that Α. 19 from some other RUF men that were there. 13:07:10 20 0. Now at this time in Mansofinia did Gullit have a rank? 21 Well, Gullit restructured the command and he called himself Α. 22 a brigadier and he also named Bazzy as another brigadier. We were in Mansofinia and now he is referring to 28 Colonel Eddie Town, so perhaps a bit more detail for that, Ms 29 Al agendra.

1 MS ALAGENDRA: Yes, your Honour: 2 Q. Witness, at which point did your group arrive in Colonel 3 Eddie Town? Give us a time. 4 Α. Well, this happened in stages from Mansofinia, Rosos, from Rosos to Colonel Eddie Town. It was around September/October 13:16:57 5 1998. 6 7 0. Witness, when did your group arrive in Colonel Eddie Town? It was in September/October 1998 was the time we arrived in 8 Α. 9 Colonel Eddie Town. And how soon after you arrived in Colonel Eddie Town did 13:17:18 10 Q. the companies change into battalions? 11 12 Α. Well, when we arrived in Colonel Eddie Town it was up to a 13 month when O-Five came and reinforced us, so after which the 14 companies changed into battalions. JUDGE SEBUTINDE: Ms Alagendra, I see Rosos is spelt in a 13:17:51 15 16 strange way. 17 MS ALAGENDRA: It is R-O-S-O-S, your Honour. Your Honours, I will be dealing with this matter in more detail when we reach 18 19 that point in the witness's testimony. 13:18:23 20 PRESIDING JUDGE: Mr Anyah, you have noted that counsel 21 will be dealing with it in more detail and that may overcome your 22 objection as to time. 23 MR ANYAH: Yes, Madam President. MS ALAGENDRA: 24 13:18:33 25 Q. Witness, going back to the restructure of these groups in 26 Mansofinia, the group in Mansofinia, you have spoken about 27 military supervisors. Gullit said now the brigade was about to move Α. 22 and we are heading for the north, he said he is giving out a 23 warning to any civilian or fighter who will attempt to escape. 24 He said that person will be executed. He also said the orders 13:23:38 **25** that are given out and whoever refuse to follow those orders will 26 be executed. 27 Q. Did he say anything else? 28 Α. As far as I can recall, these are some of the things he 29 said before the troop left. He said on the way as we are going,

1 if we encounter an attack in any town the town should be burnt
2 down as we are going ahead and as we are moving ahead we shall
3 get - we should try and get able bodied civilians to join us.
4 Q. Did he say anything about civilians who were not able

PRESIDING JUDGE: Yes, Mr Anyah?

7 MR ANYAH: Madam President, I object in this sense: We are 8 now talking about civilians and the exposure to harm or injury 9 that may have manifested itself at this time, but in Koinadugu District, in particular Mansofinia, it is not alleged in our 13:25:01 10 indictment of 29 May 2007. If the evidence were limited to the 11 12 meeting of the minds of these people during a meeting I would not 13 object, but to the extent we now start talking about treatment of 14 civilians in that area I register an objection. It is not in the 13:25:23 15 indictment.

16 PRESIDING JUDGE: Ms Al agendra?

17 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, firstly the witness hasn't spoken about any particular area which these orders related to. 18 19 Secondly, the evidence of crimes which may have taken place in 13:25:39 20 Koinadugu would be relevant under Rule 93. And also, your 21 Honour, it would go towards evidence of a widespread or 22 systematic attack which has been alleged in the indictment. Further than that, your Honour, this Court could possibly hear 23 24 evidence about this same group moving to an area which is part of the indictment and these orders could relate even to those areas 13:26:09 25 26 which are in the indictment.

27 PRESIDING JUDGE: A point of law, is it, Mr Anyah?
28 MR ANYAH: Well, of course -29 PRESIDING JUDGE: I am presuming, Ms Alagendra, you have

1 finished your submissions. I apologise.

2 MS ALAGENDRA: Yes, your Honour. 3 MR ANYAH: I thank the Court for the opportunity to respond 4 further. Rule 93(B): "Acts tending to show such a pattern of conduct shall be disclosed by the Prosecutor to the Defence 13:26:52 5 pursuant to Rule 66", meaning they have to disclose all of these 6 7 allegations pertaining to Koinadugu District to us. We have not 8 objected to this before. There has been evidence about this when 9 TF1-150 testified before this Chamber. I am registering an objection now as to this type of evidence from a district that is 13:27:13 10 not charged in the indictment. 11 12 PRESIDING JUDGE: Thank you, Mr Anyah. Just allow me to 13 consul t. 14 MR KOUMJIAN: Can we just respond to the point of law that 13:27:27 15 counsel just raised as to Rule 66? PRESIDING JUDGE: There must be an end to submissions, 16 17 Mr Koumjian, and I have refused it and I want to be consistent. 18 We consider that this is evidence of a general order or 19 command which was put on the troops en route to Freetown and 13:29:27 20 therefore is allowed. 21 MS ALAGENDRA: Your Honours, I am just having my eye on the 22 time. 23 PRESIDING JUDGE: Indeed. Thank you for that reminder, 24 Ms Alagendra. But really the witness should answer because the 13:29:46 25 question is on record. So please repeat the question, have an 26 answer and then we will adjourn. 27 MS ALAGENDRA: 28 Q. Witness, my question to you was did he say anything to you 29 about civilians who were not able bodied?

1 Α. As I said, he said on our way as we are going ahead, 2 wherever we encounter an attack we should burn down houses, that 3 village should be burnt. And on the way the civilians who were 4 able bodied, we shall recruit them.
